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SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Collections in *Part 2 of the New England Women and Their Families in the 18th and 19th Centuries: Personal Papers, Letters, and Diaries, Series C: Manuscript Collections from the Rhode Island Historical Society* have been selected by Dr. Ellen K. Rothman. These collections are a combination of diaries, correspondence, and other papers, including occasional recipes, poems, and drawings from both male and female members of families. Topics covered are family and social life and births and deaths, including the deaths of family members in a shipwreck, a volcano, and by communicable diseases. Although most of these families are from the upper middle and upper classes and have the financial means for private education, travel, and an elite social life, they are not insulated from business losses and personal hardships.

Six family collections compose Part 2 of *Series C: Manuscript Collections from the Rhode Island Historical Society*: Congdon Family Papers, 1811–1952; Diman Family Papers, 1791–1954; Sarah B. (Mason) (Ruggles) Easton Diaries, 1830–1856; Herreshoff-DeWolf Family Papers, 1854–1985; Herreshoff-Lewis Family Papers (1783–1921); and Jeanie (Lippitt) Weeden Papers, 1882–1939. Within these collections are several generations of people with the same names, and whenever possible, the indexer has written the number of generation, (1), (2), or (3) after the name. (A few folder titles also indicate the number of generation.) Some correspondence has not been indexed because only a first name appears.

Following are descriptions of the collections included in this part from the Rhode Island Historical Society.

Congdon Family Papers

The papers in this collection cover four generations of the Congdon family of Exeter and East Greenwich, Rhode Island. Several men in the Congdon family were mariners. The men of the first two generations represented, Peleg Congdon (1784–1862) and his son John Remington Congdon (1819–1863), were sea captains. The father of John's wife Cynthia (Sprague) Congdon had been a mariner; as was Asmus Ferdinand Carstein (1842–1874), the first husband of John's daughter Mary Remington Congdon. The Congdon family were Quakers (Friends of Society).

Peleg Congdon was born in Exeter, Rhode Island, the son of John Congdon and his third wife, Abigail Carr. Peleg married Mary Remington (1792–1820) of Warwick in 1816; she was the daughter of Henry Remington and Margaret LeValley. Besides being a sea captain, Peleg kept a hotel in the village of Apponaug, in Warwick, from 1819 to 1832; after this period, he moved to East Greenwich. He later was employed by the federal government, directing shipbuilding.

Five folders contain Paleg Congdon's papers, consisting of correspondence, financial papers, and a memorandum book with entries of historical notes and thoughtful comments, such as "The Republican virtues ... may they never be corrupted by ambition or poisoned by foreign influence" (Reel 9, Frame 0404).

Peleg and Mary's son, **John Remington Congdon**, was born August 6, 1819, probably in Apponaug. Not much is known of his childhood. His mother died the year after he was born. John Congdon's only career was that of sea captain. He spent most of his adult life on the water, conducting trading voyages all over the world. His destinations included the southern and western coasts of the United States, South America, Africa, China, Singapore, Calcutta, France, Scotland, and Ireland. He first went to sea at the age of sixteen, serving as ship's boy on the bark *Index* (George

Barrell, master) from 1836 to 1837. He then served as ship's boy on the ship *Oneida* from 1837 to 1838. By the age of 20, he had reached the status of second mate, serving in that capacity on the ships *Albion* (1840–1841) and *Sophia* (1841–1842), and the bark *Weybosset* (1844–1846). On his next voyage on the bark *Montgomery* (1846–1848), Congdon started out as first mate; he became master of the vessel in 1848. The *Montgomery* was wrecked in an Atlantic hurricane off the northeastern U. S. coast in September 1848; the survivors were picked up by the packet *Elijah Swift*, bound for Scotland, after drifting five days in a lifeboat. Congdon next sailed as master of the brigs *Oriental* (1849–1850) and *Sacramento* (1850–1852), the bark *Hannah Thornton* (1852–1854), and the clipper ship *Caroline Tucker* (1855–1863). He died February 28, 1863, when he was swept off the *Caroline Tucker* in a heavy gale while attempting to round Cape Horn. Congdon had married Cynthia Sprague (1820–1880) of East Greenwich in 1842. She was the daughter of mariner John Sprague (1784–1822) and his second wife, Lydia Anthony (1794–1877).

Cynthia Sprague Congdon and her husband had a deeply committed relationship. They had two children, Mary Remington Congdon (1842–1916) and George Barrell Congdon (1846–1902). George was named after the master of the bark *Index*, the first vessel on which his father sailed. Both children, along with their mother, accompanied John Congdon on sea voyages at various times between 1852 and 1862. During the first few years of her marriage, Cynthia remained at home when her husband sailed; but by 1852, the emotional hardship she endured during his absences induced her to accompany him to San Francisco on the brig *Hannah Thornton*, along with young George.

Cynthia Congdon never remarried after John Congdon's death. She lived in East Greenwich the remainder of her life, and died at the age of fifty-nine.

Cynthia Congdon's papers consist of one folder of correspondence, two diaries, and financial papers. The diaries are arguably the most interesting, providing glimpses into her social and work life in East Greenwich both before and after her marriage, and her voyage on the *Hannah Thornton* between 1852 and 1854. Her correspondence is mostly from her husband, describing his travels and activities while sailing, and there are a few letters from Congdon's brother Henry (1863 to 1867) concerning payments to Cynthia out of John's estate. Letters of particular interest are one dated December 15, 1844, by Cynthia to her cousin Phebe Vaughn in New York, which mentions a Rhode Island earthquake and one from her brother-in-law Henry Congdon, dated October 2, 1848, concerning the wreck of the *Montgomery* in 1848: "I think they encountered the Gale of the 24th, 5th, & 6th that was so disastrous the whole length and breadth of the Atlantic" (Reel 3, Frame 0754).

Mary Remington Congdon sailed with her parents on the *Hannah Thornton*'s second voyage in 1854, and on the *Caroline Tucker* from 1860 to 1862. She began writing journals both at home and at sea at the behest of her father. In a letter to Mary dated April 14, 1851, John Congdon told his daughter, "As soon as you learn to write well, Pa Pa wishes for you to keep a little journal, to write in every day some; tell how you feel, if well, or sick ... Pa Pa will get all books necessary for you...." (Reel 4, Folder Frame 0280).

When not sailing with their parents, Mary and her brother lived under the care of their grandmother, Lydia Sprague, and attended school. Mary attended the Hillside Boarding and Day School for Young Ladies in East Greenwich.

In 1870, Mary married German seafarer Asmus Ferdinand (Ferd) Carstein (1842–1874); he died suddenly at the age of thirty-one. Mary was married again in 1883 to her second cousin James Vaughn Dearstyne (1849–1892), a New York hotel operator. She had two daughters, both by her first marriage: Mary Catharina (1872–1882), who died of heart disease, and Margarethe (Carstein) Allen (1874–1955), who married Thomas Allen (1874–1948).

In his youth, **George B. Congdon** attended the Friends' School (later the Moses Brown school) in Providence. He remained in Providence after his school years. For part of his adult life, he was a traveling salesman for Congdon & Aylesworth, wholesale shoe and boot dealers. After retiring from this business he became involved in photography. In 1902, he died suddenly in Providence while shooting a photograph in Roger Williams Park (Reel 9, Frame 0238).

Although four generations of Congdons are represented in this collection, the papers of the second and third generations—John Remington Congdon, his wife Cynthia, and their daughter,

Mary R. (Congdon) Carstein Dearstyne— are central to the collection. Generally, the collection includes correspondence; personal journals; journals of maritime trading voyages; ships' logs and papers, including invoices and receipts; and household accounts and account books, dating between 1815 and 1916. The bulk of the ships' papers, including the logs and journals, are those of John R. Congdon, and fall between the dates 1836 and 1863. There are five folders containing papers of Peleg Congdon, John's father, consisting of correspondence, financial papers, and a memoranda book. Most of the letters in the two folders of correspondence are from the woman he married, Mary Remington, and contain social and domestic news, and her personal reflections on their relationship. In one letter Congdon wrote, "The Republican virtues...may they never be corrupted by ambition or poisoned by foreign influence" (Reel 9, Frame 0404). Letters to Congdon signed "S H" are probably those of Mary Remington's cousin Sarah Holden (1792?–1815), the daughter of Mary's aunt Sarah (Remington) Holden (see two letters from Mary and "S H" dated March 12, 1812) (Reel 9, Frame 0251). Several of Mary's letters speculate as to Peleg's personal character and suitability as a husband and some letters after the marriage indicate there were problems in the relationship. Unfortunately, there is only one letter in the collection from Peleg to Mary, containing little personal content, and written well before their marriage (1812). The papers of Peleg's son, **John Remington Congdon**, consist primarily of personal journals he wrote at sea, ships' logs, and financial papers. There is only one folder of correspondence to him; most of it is from his wife Cynthia, relating personal thoughts and domestic news. His brother Henry Remington Congdon also wrote, mainly about business and shipping. Both John and Cynthia kept journals for the sake of the other. John's, of which there are fifteen, provide an extremely detailed picture of shipboard life over a period of sixteen years (1836 to 1852). Those he wrote after his marriage to Cynthia in 1842 are dedicated to her "amusement, instruction, and satisfaction," including poems and newspaper clippings to her, and reflections on the institution of marriage. Entries are written as though he is addressing her directly, commonly bidding her good night or morning.

The last of three journals kept by John Congdon on board the bark *Montgomery* describe in detail the wreck of that vessel in September 1848.

I heard the cries of 'Oh God, save me,' 'Oh, I can't swim,' 'What shall we do?' and 'God have mercy on us etc.' ...used hats to bail water and tore off pieces of board from the bottom of boat to form into paddles and made a sail for the boat. Had some food, mostly cheese, dried apples, bread soaked with salt water, rum, and flour. Had no water, rationed therum for water. ...rescued by *Elijah Swift* and taken to Glasgow, then Liverpool and to the Consul. (Reel 1, Frame 0986)

A journal for the brig *Sacramento* includes a sketch of the vessel on the inside front cover. The final entries in Congdon's last journal (1862–1863) document his despairing final days on board the clipper ship *Caroline Tucker*, which was disabled in storms off Cape Horn. The last entry indicating seas were too rough to write was written the day before Congdon was swept off the ship and drowned. A letter from A. C. Dickens to Congdon's brother Henry, dated April 15, 1863 (Reel 9, Folder Frame 0242), describes Congdon's fate in more detail. Also present in the collection are ten ships' logs that Congdon kept from 1849 to 1863. These record trading voyages he undertook while master of the *Oriental*, *Sacramento*, *Hannah Thornton*, and *Caroline Tucker*. Congdon's financial papers include two lists of persons in Glasgow, Scotland, who donated money to him after the *Montgomery* was shipwrecked in 1848, and an 1861 receipt for portraits of his family he had done while in Paris. A separate folder of receipts, dated between 1855 and 1859, for Congdon's daughter Mary's education, indicate the types of subjects she studied. An unwitnessed will that Congdon wrote at sea in 1862, a few days after embarking on what was to be his final journey, is also in the collection.

The largest volume of diaries (thirty-nine) and correspondence in the collection belongs to **Mary (Congdon) Carstein Dearstyne**. Her diaries, however, with the exception of six she wrote between 1854 and 1865, do not necessarily contain the most interesting content; those she wrote after 1865 consist mainly of brief daily entries. Among the six mentioned above are four that she wrote at sea,

one on the *Hannah Thornton*, and three on the *Caroline Tucker* include interesting observations about shipboard life, interactions with crew members, homesickness, visits to foreign ports, and ocean wildlife. Mary's last sea journal includes entries made after she arrived home at East Greenwich (1863–1865).

Diman Family Papers

Byron Diman (1795–1865) served as governor of Rhode Island from 1846 to 1847. He was born in Bristol, the eldest son of Jeremiah and Hannah (Luther) Diman. At the age of sixteen he entered the counting house of James DeWolf of Bristol, Rhode Island, whose business interests included the West Indies trade. Diman remained in the shipping and whaling industries for several years. He was treasurer and later president of the Bristol Steam Mill; a director of the Pokanoket Mill; and for many years, president of the Bank of Bristol.

Byron Diman was married twice, first to Abigail Alden Wight in 1823; second to Elizabeth Ann Wood, in 1855. He and his first wife had six children, four of whom lived to maturity. One son, **Henry Wight Diman** (1835–1884), was a paymaster during the Civil War. He was also a justice of the peace and public notary for the town of Bristol.

Another son of Byron and Abigail Diman was **Jeremiah Lewis Diman** (1831–1881), who was a clergyman, and later became a professor of history at Brown University. Jeremiah Diman married Emily G. Stimson (1837–1901), the daughter of John J. Stimson (1798–1860) and Abby M. Clarke (1798–1882). Jeremiah and **Emily Stimson Diman** had four children: Maria S. (1862–1881), Rev. John B. Diman (1863–after 1940); Louise (1869–1954), never married; and Emily (1873–1949), never married. Louise was a teacher and was involved in the founding of the Providence Animal Rescue League in 1913.

The histories of the firms C.R. Diman & Co. and Derol Diman & Co. have not been established. They were both in business in Bristol, Rhode Island, during the 1840s and 1850s, and appear to have been maritime merchants.

This collection consists mainly of correspondence and diaries of several members of the Diman family of Bristol, spanning about 150 years. There is also a small assortment of maritime, financial, and miscellaneous papers. Specifically, the distribution of the diaries is as follows: one diary each from John J. and his wife Abby (Stimson) Diman; nine diaries of Jeremiah Lewis Diman; and 37 diaries of Louise Diman. Louise Diman's autograph book includes an illustrated inscription from famed Providence feminist author Charlotte Perkins.

The bulk of the correspondence is to Louise Diman, from her brother John and her mother Emily. There is one folder of letters to Louise's sister Emily, also mostly from their mother. There are four folders of correspondence to Byron Diman covering his career as merchant and as Rhode Island governor. A series of letters from 1845 discusses the Narragansett Indian School in Charlestown.

A letter from W. P. Sheffield to Henry W. Diman, dated July 19, 1861, contains the following remarks:

Gov. Sprague has won an enviable distinction here, strange as it may appear to you. I solemnly believe that at this hour, there is not a man in this country who has a stronger hold upon the populace (*sic*) heart. The story of his little acts, has run from soldier to soldier, from camp to camp, and been magnified at each recital. It has been told in letters to the fathers, mothers, sisters and friends until his name has become familiar to every loyal heart in the land. (Reel 10, Folder Frame 0097)

The **Louise Diman** diaries document most of her life from age ten to age eighty-four. They include volumes written as a girl in Providence, as a teacher in Providence and Colorado, as a summer resident in Maine, and as a retiree in Providence. The writing quality was excellent in the

childhood volumes. Diman wrote only brief entries from 1894 to 1907, which then gradually improved as her leisure time increased.

Sarah B. (Mason) (Ruggles) Eaton Diaries

Sarah Brown Mason was born on July 25, 1804 in Providence, Rhode Island. She was a granddaughter of John Brown (1736–1803), who had been the wealthiest man in Providence. Her parents were physician James Brown Mason (1775–1819) and Alice Brown (1777–1823). She had two sisters: Abby Mason (1800–1822), who married Nicholas Brown III, and Rose Anne Mason (1817–1872), who married Dr. William Grosvenor.

Sarah's parents both died when she was in her teens, and she inherited substantial property in Providence, Rhode Island. Her first marriage to George B. Ruggles was at times unhappy, and his business setbacks led to the loss of a substantial portion of Sarah's inherited property. They had four children and only son George B. Ruggles survived past early childhood. He graduated from Brown University and became a farmer in Chepachet, Rhode Island.

Sarah's husband George B. Ruggles died in 1833 and three of their children died shortly thereafter. Sarah became very lonely and whatever unhappiness she encountered during the marriage was not evident when she wrote in her diary:

My George, my love...My husband! Thou wert my shield! My support!

My George, my loved one! Canst thou be now aware of the grief of thy desolate wife—
Shine own dear Sarah! Oh no, no, no! The joys of heaven would then be imperfect—it
cannot be! (Reel 16, Frame 0565)

With just George Jr. remaining in the family, Sarah remarried to lawyer Levi C. Eaton (1811–1852) on October 12, 1837. They had five children together and all but sons Amasa and Charles died young. Amasa M. Eaton became a Providence, Rhode Island, lawyer and state representative and Charles F. Eaton became an artist in Santa Barbara, California. Levi C. Eaton died in 1852, as well as Sarah's youngest son. Sarah and her surviving children embarked on a three-year trip to Europe (mostly France and Italy), returning late in 1855. Sarah B. Mason Ruggles Eaton died on August 1, 1864.

The bulk of this collection consists of twenty-four diaries written between 1830 and 1856. This covers a span from late in Sarah B. Mason Ruggles Eaton's first marriage, when she was twenty-five years old, through several years after the death of her second husband, when she was fifty-one. The entries are almost daily, but at least ten long periods are missing, covering a total of about ten years. The gaps seem to coincide with dramatic events such as the birth and deaths of close relatives.

These are very important diaries and are among the earliest extended detailed accounts of the Providence social elite, and the story of Sarah's first marriage is certainly an interesting one.

Herreshoff-DeWolf Family Papers

John Brown Herreshoff (1841–1914) of Bristol, Rhode Island, though blind from childhood, founded the Herreshoff Manufacturing Company with his brother Nathaniel G. Herreshoff. This company became one of America's preeminent yacht manufacturers. John's first marriage to Sarah Lucas ("Sadie") Kilton was turbulent. They were separated in 1885 and finally granted a divorce in 1891. **Sarah (Sadie) Lucas (Kilton) Herreshoff** (1837–1906) was the daughter of John and Catherine Kilton of Boston. She continued to live in Bristol after her divorce. John later remarried to Eugenia T. Tucker. John and Sadie had one child, Katherine Kilton Herreshoff (1871–1954). She married Lewis DeWolf of Bristol (1853–1900) in 1896. He was a brother of her uncle Nat Herreshoff's wife Clara DeWolf. After his death, she remarried marine photographer Walter James Tubbs (d. ca. 1906), also of Bristol, in January 1901. Shortly after the death of her second husband, Katherine once again began using the name Mrs. Katherine DeWolf. In addition to her home in

Bristol, she resided in Natick and Wellesley, Massachusetts, in her later years. Katherine and Lewis DeWolf had two daughters, Katherine H. DeWolf (1897–1978) and Louise Henry DeWolf (1898–1986). Louise remained in Bristol for all of her long life, and never married.

This collection contains some papers of five members of this family: John Brown Herreshoff, Sarah “Sadie” L. (Kilton) Herreshoff, **Katherine Kilton (Herreshoff) DeWolf Tubbs**, Louise H. DeWolf and Katherine’s aunt, Grace (DeWolf) Lugo-Vina of San Juan, Puerto Rico. The Sadie Herreshoff papers include extensive material on her separation and divorce from 1885 to 1891, including correspondence, legal papers, and a diary that was apparently kept as evidence. She retained ownership and occupancy of a house that adjoined the property of John’s yacht company, which kept tensions running high. This routine-looking memorandum epitomizes the tone of the proceedings: “Dec. 9, 1887. To S. L. Herreshoff, Bristol, R.I. You are hereby requested to make new arrangements for sewerage from the house no. 9 Burnside St., as, during the ensuing week, the drain pipe from that house will be cut off from its connection to our private drain—Herreshoff Mfg. Co.” Sadie Herreshoff’s later diary entries provide compelling documentation of her crumbling marriage. The earlier volumes are good travel journals. The diaries were all written between the ages of forty-four and forty-eight. The diaries from 1881 through August 1884 do little to suggest a marriage in crisis, but beginning in November of 1884, Sadie records a litany of injustices. Sadie was very religious. Her husband’s disregard for the Sabbath is one of many causes of stress in their marriage. Many particularly grievous passages are underlined, possibly for later use in divorce court. One sample can suggest the tone of the rest:

Then, standing on the threshold he spoke with more vehemence than I almost ever heard him use before— saying ‘damned infernal old fool— you better sell me the house & take your brat & go to hell, yes, go to hell—just as soon as you can paddle.’ This in substance was repeated over & over again. I got up from the desk for fear that he would throw something at me & so hid oil lamp by my side & went to the front cubby threshold not knowing what may come next, but he went out. (Reel 17, Folder Frame 0073)

After several months, John left the house for good when Sadie refused to sign over the house in his name. Sadie remained in the house in Bristol with her daughter for the ensuing months, as lawyers maneuvered and both parents competed for the affections of thirteen-year-old Katherine.

Sadie Herreshoff’s daughter Katherine also kept a diary during the divorce proceedings in 1887. It was written when she was fifteen years old. There is no direct mention of her parents’ separation. The following extract may be of interest: “Went to the matinee. Margaret Mather in London Assurance & Mad Scene from Faust. The latter was very sad as she was in prison, & her lover came in for her but she did not know him as she was mad. I was quite taken with Miss Mather” (Reel 19, Folder Frame 0178). Katharine was apparently living with her mother during this time, which makes the frequent mentions of her father much more interesting. In contrast, her mother does not seem ever to be mentioned.

Herreshoff-Lewis Family Papers, 1783–1921

The first Herreshoff in America was **Charles F. Herreshoff** (1763–1819), who emigrated from Prussia around 1786. He married into the famous Brown family of Rhode Island, acquired a large estate in Bristol, Rhode Island, and raised five children there. It was members of the third generation, however, who went into yacht-making, founded the Herreshoff Manufacturing Company, and brought international fame to the family name.

This collection contains a substantial portion of the personal papers of several members of the Herreshoff and Lewis families. Members represented include the immigrant Charles F. Herreshoff (1) and his wife **Sarah (Brown) Herreshoff**; their five children, including Charles F. Herreshoff (2) and his wife **Julia Ann (Lewis) Herreshoff**, Agnes F. (2) Herreshoff; Charles F. (2) Herreshoff’s two unmarried children, Lewis (3) Herreshoff, and Sally (3) Herreshoff, as well as Caroline (3) (Herreshoff) Chesebro; and an unmarried granddaughter Julia A (4) Herreshoff. There are also

papers of the Lewis family: Joseph W. Lewis, Mary W. Lewis, and correspondence to and from other members of the Lewis family

Charles F. Herreshoff's daughters **Agnes F. (2) Herreshoff** (1807–1849), **Sarah B. (2) Herreshoff** (1803–1882), and **Anna Francis (2) Herreshoff** (1802–1887) never married and remained with the family at Poppasquash and the John Brown House for their entire lives. Deeply religious, they helped to care for their elderly mother and their many nieces and nephews. Charles F. Herreshoff's oldest son, **John Brown (2) Herreshoff** (1805–1861), studied law at Brown University though he never practiced law. He never married. **Charles F. (2) Herreshoff** (1809–1888) was the only child to raise a family of his own. He married Julia Ann Lewis (1811–1901) in 1833. Charles devoted much of his time to his hobby of yacht-building in which he interested his children as well.

Caroline L. (3) Herreshoff Chesebro (1837–1924) was the eldest daughter of Charles F. (2) Herreshoff and Julia A. (Lewis) Herreshoff. She married E. Stanton Chesebro and they had one son, **Albert S. Chesebro** (1868–1916). Caroline corresponded about family matters, and of particular concern was her brother John going blind: "Dr. Briggs has just applied leeches to John's face for his eyes, but they would not take hold."

Charles F. (2) Herreshoff's unmarried children, **Lewis (3) Herreshoff** and **Sally B. (3) Herreshoff** (1845–1917), like three of their siblings, became blind during childhood. Lewis never married and was a talented amateur singer, was involved to some extent in the family yacht business, wrote several articles on yachting that were well received, dabbled in a series of investments, traveled to Europe and California, tutored children, pursued genealogy, and generally served as a local character. Sally had a quiet, religious disposition and like many of the Herreshoffs was a capable pianist. She typed a brief diary on four loose sheets in early 1888. Both Sally and Lewis used typewriters to maintain extensive correspondence.

Charles F. (3) Herreshoff (1839–1917) inherited not only the name of his father and grandfather, but also his role of country squire. He married first Mary Potter (1843–1866 and then Alice Almy (1838–1931). By Mary he had one daughter, Julia Ann (4) Herreshoff (1864–1942), who never married.

Throughout the collections are accounts of family members traveling by steamboat and sometimes staying in one place for an extended period of time. Louisa Prentis, a Herreshoff cousin, wrote the following while on such a voyage:

There are nine American vessels in port. They nearly all brought coal from Philadelphia and Baltimore, and the sailors are acting as if they were possessed, they get filled up with this cheaper white rum and act like Satan. (Reel 26, Frame 0180)

Louisa Prentis also wrote about current news at the time and following is her reaction to President William McKinley's assassination:

Was not the assassination of our President a dastardly act.... Mrs. McKinley's courage is wonderful...she is not capable of taking her great bereavement completely in owing to her having been such a terrible sufferer from... fits. The president always carried a veil or lace shawl in his pocket handy and kept a sharp watch over her and when he saw a fit coming would throw it over her face until she would get over it. (Reel 26, Frame 0180)

Inserted at the end of Louisa Prentis's writing is this note: "The writer of letter with those of her family in Martinique all perished in volcano eruption of Mt. Pelée that destroyed St. Pierre and all the inhabitants 8 May, 1902."

There is also some correspondence to and from John B. Herreshoff's widowed sister, Carrie Herreshoff. Included are some entertaining letters from a suitor named Henry [H. Brownell?] on Reel 24, Frames 0529, 0533, and 0535:

My dear Carrie

Cannot possibly wait to receive that miserable letter of yours which should have been here two weeks ago, according to the time of my Heart.... Sorely puzzled would our scientific clockmaker be, to regulate his brass movements to the pulsations of young hearts!

...This morning whilst traveling to Sunday school Jack Frost kissed my big toe which kiss the aforesaid big toe has not yet forgotten. Alas moreover particularly Mr. Toothache arrived a short time since has taken comfortable quarters in one of my Ivories—he has imparted to me the interesting intelligence that he is first cousin by the Maternal side to Mr. Chillblaine whom you esteem so highly—Selah!

...Recipe not in the latest Cookery books! Green trees, clouds, saltwater, fish-hawks, fancies—equal quantity of each with a double allowance of Carrie Herreshoff!

“Four & twenty Blackbirds
Baking in a pie!”

Dear cruel Carrie

Received you letter from Iceland Friday morning the 13th. I have not had the heart to write one letter since.... No friend of mine has ever written me such a chilling letter. Read it as I will, the only meaning I can find in it is this: “Mr. Hotham. Dear Sir. Ice is one cent per pound. Yours truly, Carrie”

Jeanie (Lippitt) Weeden

Henry Lippitt (1818–1891) was heavily involved in the family textile business. He married Mary Ann Balch (1823–1889), daughter of Dr. Joseph Balch, in 1845. He was governor of Rhode Island in 1875 and 1876. He and his wife Mary Ann had eleven children, including Charles Warren Lippitt (1846–1924), R.I. governor in 1896; Jeanie (Lippitt) Weeden (1852–1940); Henry Frederick Lippitt; (1856–1933), U.S. Senator, 1911–1917; Mary Balch (Lippitt) Steedman (1858–1938); and Robert Lincoln Lippitt (1860–1910).

Jeanie (Lippitt) Weeden lost her hearing at the age of four after contracting scarlet fever. Her mother rebelled against the contemporary belief that deaf and mute children could learn to communicate only by signing. She set about teaching Jeanie to lip read and speak so that she would not be isolated from general society, engaging household servants in the process. Jeanie’s speech was refined by the instruction of Alexander Graham Bell, who prior to his invention of the telephone taught voice physiology in Boston.

Jeanie’s demonstrated success in lip reading and speaking ultimately led to the establishment of the Rhode Island School for the Deaf in 1876. That year, her father Henry Lippitt, at that time governor of Rhode Island, successfully presented a bill to the General Assembly requesting approval for the creation of the school. Jeanie married William Babcock Weeden in 1893.

The Lippitt family represented in this collection comprised prominent and wealthy cotton manufacturers and politicians. The Lippitts’ textile interests in Rhode Island were started in 1809 by brothers Christopher (1744–1824) and Charles Lippitt (1754–1845), sons of Christopher (1712–1764) and Catharine (Holden) Lippitt. The younger Christopher was a Revolutionary War officer who engaged in farming after the war. His brother Charles was a Providence merchant. In 1809, the brothers, along with Benjamin Aborn, George Jackson, Amasa Mason, and William Mason organized

a cotton mill under the name Lippitt Manufacturing Company. The company grew into a major cotton manufacturer during the nineteenth century, with several succeeding generations becoming involved in its operations and administration, and inheriting the benefits of its financial legacy.

Charles Lippitt married Penelope Low, the daughter of John and Sarah (Wickes) Low, in 1783. They had at least three children. Julia (1874–1867) married Joseph Sweet. Sarah Wickes Lippitt (1789–1847) never married. Warren Lippitt (1786–1850) became a mariner at the age of sixteen, and was made captain by the age of twenty-two. He sailed until 1816, then went into a business partnership in Savannah, Georgia, dealing in groceries and cotton. He alternated his residences seasonally between Providence and Savannah.

Charles Warren Lippitt, son of Henry and Mary Ann Lippitt, graduated from Brown University in 1865. He married Margaret Barbara Farnum (1860–1940) of Providence in 1886. They had six children. The first three (Charles, Alexander, and Jeanie) died of scarlet fever within a single week, from December 26, 1893, to January 1, 1894. A fourth child, Alexander Farnum (c1896–1918) was killed in World War I. The two youngest sons, Charles Warren (2) (1894–1970) and Gorton Thayer (1898–1978) also fought in World War I, in France. Upon returning from the war in 1919, Gorton Thayer Lippitt, suffered from physical and nervous effects from poison gas, and spent several years attempting to determine his professional and financial future. In 1921, he married Wisconsin native Katharine (“Kay”) Lindsay, in Wisconsin. Soon after their marriage, and with money from both families at their disposal, they began a five-year sojourn around the world, traveling through countries in Europe and Asia, the Soviet Union, Hawaii, Japan, Australia, and the South Pacific between 1921 and 1926. They lived and worked in several areas along the way and had two of their four children, Alexander and David, during their travels. Their other children were Ruth Hutchinson and Katharine. In the early 1950s, Gorton and Kay separated; it appears they legally separated or divorced in 1954, and Katharine re-located to either Massachusetts or Wisconsin. Gorton died at the age of 80 in 1978, and is buried in Swan Point Cemetery.

Jeanie (Lippitt) Weeden's papers include three folders of correspondence, an 1882 travel diary, an essay on her education, and genealogical papers. Much of the correspondence is genealogical, and provides potentially useful information on the Balch and Lippitt families. There are also personal letters from her husband (1898), friend Hattie Peters (1898 and undated), brother Charles W. Lippitt (1905 and undated), Lillian Buffum Chace Wyman (1918), and nephew Gorton Lippitt (1921–1928). A folder of 1935 correspondence regarding the Gilbert Stuart Memorial includes a short note from educator and author Caroline Hazard. Two letters from brother Henry F. Lippitt dated July 20 and August 26, 1922, discusses the institutionalization of their brother Charles; the latter letter reads in part, “This dying business is a poor thing anyway & I suppose there is no really good way of pulling it off.” There is also a series of letters relating to her step-granddaughter Florence Durfee's divorce proceedings in 1933 (Reel 27, Folder Frame 0774).

Almost all of the correspondence of Margaret B. F. Lippitt is from her son, Gorton Thayer Lippitt. A letter written to Charles Warren Lippitt Jr. from Margaret, dated October 10, 1918, explains the circumstances of the death of his brother Alexander Farnum Lippitt. The letter is included in Gorton Lippitt's correspondence, as the letter was intended (per its content) to be passed along to him.

Some of the writings of Gorton Lippitt from the 1920s, written as he encountered, observed, and pondered international cultures, are amazingly prophetic in regard to the world's political and economic affairs, especially the Great Depression and the Second World War. In a journal entry written on October 30, 1920, he wrote:

Twenty or thirty years! ...They say a war is coming then; they say that it will be more terrible, more brutal, more scientific than this last? I guess that they are right, and that the world will survive the tempest but it seems that a further extension of horror than there was in the world these last few years would be impossible save with the extinction of the vanquished. (Reel 27, Folder Frame 0666)

In this part of Series C researchers will find raw and colorful reflections of history, high society, travel, love, courtship, marriage, and divorce. The family triumphs and losses make an indelible impression on anyone encountering these Rhode Island Historical Society collections.

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This edition of *New England Women and Their Families in the 18th and 19th Centuries: Personal Papers, Letters, and Diaries* has been selected from the holdings of the Rhode Island Historical Society by Dr. Ellen K. Rothman. These collections are a combination of diaries, correspondence, and other papers, including occasional recipes, poems, and drawings from both male and female members of families. Topics covered range from family business and social life to births and deaths, including the deaths of family members in a shipwreck, a volcano, and by communicable diseases. Although most of these families are from the upper middle and upper classes and have the financial means for private education, travel, and an elite social life, they are not insulated from business and personal losses and hardships.

Six family collections compose Part 2 of *Series C: Manuscript Collections from the Rhode Island Historical Society*: Congdon Family Papers, 1811–1952; Diman Family Papers, 1791–1954; Sarah B. (Mason) (Ruggles) Easton Diaries, 1830–1856; Herreshoff-DeWolf Family Papers; Herreshoff-Lewis Family Papers (1783–1921); and Jeanie (Lippitt) Weeden Papers, 1882–1939.

The Congdon Family Papers include the diaries kept by mariner John Remington Congdon. Those he wrote after his marriage to Cynthia Sprague in 1842 are dedicated to her “amusement, instruction, and satisfaction.” He reveals his passion for her as well as his deep religious faith.

The last of three journals kept by John Congdon on board the bark *Montgomery* describe in detail the wreck of that vessel in September 1848: “I heard the cries of ‘Oh God, save me...used hats to bail water and tore off pieces of board from the bottom of boat to form into paddles...rationed therum for water....’ [Reel 1, Frame 0986]

John R. Congdon was swept overboard and lost at sea rounding Cape Horn February 28, 1863, while on a voyage as master of clipper ship *Caroline Tucker*.

Sarah B. (Mason) (Ruggles) Eaton wrote twenty-four diaries, from late in her first marriage in 1825 through several years after the death of her second husband. She was a granddaughter of John Brown (1736–1803), who had been the wealthiest man in Providence, Rhode Island. Sarah’s husband George B. Ruggles died in 1833, and three of their children died shortly thereafter. Sarah became very lonely and whatever unhappiness she encountered during the marriage was not evident when in grief she wrote in her diary: “My George, my love...My husband! Thou wert my shield! My support!” [Reel 16, Frame 0565]

The Herreshoff families were mainly ship and yacht builders. Throughout the collections are accounts of family members traveling by steamboat and sometimes staying in one place for an extended period of time. Louisa Prentis, a Herreshoff cousin, wrote the following while on such a voyage: “There are nine American vessels in port. They nearly all brought coal from Philadelphia and Baltimore, and the sailors are acting as if they were possessed, they get filled up with this cheaper white rum and act like Satan.” [Reel 26, Frame 0180]

Inserted at the end of Louisa Prentis’s writing is this note: “The writer of letter with those of her family in Martinique all perished in volcano eruption of Mt. Pelée that destroyed St. Pierre and all the inhabitants 8 May, 1902.”

Researchers will find raw and colorful reflections of history, high society, travel, love, courtship, marriage, and divorce. The family triumphs and losses make an indelible impression on anyone encountering these Rhode Island Historical Society collections.
