SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This edition contains General Office Files selected by Professors John H. Bracey and August Meier from Group III of the NAACP Collection (1956–1965). These are subject files that have not been microfilmed with other UPA editions of *Papers of the NAACP*, and they are not sufficiently large to constitute their own separate editions. Thus they have been combined in an omnibus edition, *Part 24: Special Subjects, 1956–1965*. Part 24 is arranged alphabetically by subject, and it is divided into series A through C. Series A includes alphabetical subject files from “A” through “F” (“Africa” through “Films”). This edition—Series B—runs from “F” through “L” (“Foreign Affairs” through “Leagues and Organizations”). Series C completes the alphabetical subjects, running from “L” through “Z” (“Life Memberships” through “Zangrando”).

The subject files that have been selected document many important aspects of the NAACP program between 1956 and 1965 as well as various facets of American race relations during the period. Taken together, these miscellaneous subject files serve as a valuable reference collection on the range of issues that engaged the NAACP from 1956 to 1965. Earlier editions of Special Subject Files can be found in *Papers of the NAACP, Part 11: Special Subjects, 1910–1939* and *Papers of the NAACP, Part 18: Special Subjects, 1940–1955*. Researchers should note that many of the subjects covered in Part 24 have earlier files in Parts 11 and 18.

The major subject files in Series B contain material on “Foreign Affairs,” “Fund-raising,” and general administration (as revealed in “Form Letters”). NAACP political activities are well documented on federal, state, and many local levels in the “Government” subject series. A large series of “Hate Material” depicts the intensity of racism in America during the period. Separate series on the Japanese Americans and Jews provide rich information on NAACP relations with these two important ethnic groups. A large series on John F. Kennedy complements the Government series in documenting NAACP relations with Kennedy as both senator and president. The large series designated as “Leagues and Organizations” documents the NAACP’s relations with many political, religious, labor, and civil rights organizations between 1956 and 1965. Scattered throughout the edition are files on prominent individuals, such as Lena Horne, Langston Hughes, W. C. Handy, Mahalia Jackson, and Nikita Khrushchev.

The "Foreign Affairs" series (Reel 1, frames 0001 through 0258) documents NAACP reactions to cold war-era events, including the Hungarian refugee influx of the 1950s. There are scattered references to colonial liberation movements, especially the French withdrawal from Algeria. A larger amount of material pertains to the growing crisis in Vietnam, and there is also a significant amount of material on the Arab-Israeli conflict, including material on the relationship between the African American and Jewish communities.

The "Form Letters" series (Reel 1, frame 0297 through Reel 2, frame 0468) was selected because it provides an excellent overview of the scope of NAACP activities between 1956 and 1960. It also reveals the strategies the NAACP used and the executive style of national NAACP leaders. The form letters enable researchers to appreciate the month-to-month activities of the NAACP national office, including the management of major desegregation campaigns, organization of voter registration drives, fund-raising, forging of political alliances, legislative work on civil rights issues, and crafting public relations programs on behalf of civil rights. There is also extensive material documenting the NAACP's reactions to adverse events, ranging from lynching and the murders of civil rights workers to conservative political initiatives. There is scattered information on conditions within African American communities, such as employment opportunities (or lack thereof) and housing conditions. The series does not extend beyond 1960. The subjects are of such variety that researchers should scan the Major Topics entries for each folder to appreciate the scope of NAACP activities. The subject index portion of the user guide can be of use in locating specific topics in the Form Letter files.

NAACP fund-raising work is documented in a cluster of file series that begins on Reel 2, frame 0469 with files on the "Freedom Fund Campaign," continues with records on the annual "Freedom Fund Dinner" (Reel 4, frame 0467 through Reel 13, frame 0298), the "Freedom National Bank" at Reel 13, frame 0299, and the "Freedom TV Spectacular" (Reel 13, frame 0309 through Reel 15, frame 0398), and concludes with the general files on "Fund Raising" (Reel 15, frame 0412 through Reel 18, frame 0568).

The Campaign for Freedom was an effort by the NAACP to develop a more professional fund-raising program. By the late 1950s, association executives realized that effective fund-raising techniques had been developed in ways that went beyond their traditional membership recruitment drives. Mass media communications, such as television, had been underutilized by the association and many potential sources of financial support for the organization outside its own membership were not as effectively solicited as they might have been. Moreover, NAACP fund-raising tended to concentrate on periodic campaigns, membership drives, and special events. The association decided that it needed to mount a sustained full-time fund-raising

program: the Freedom Fund. It grew out of the Fighting Fund For Freedom Campaign, which raised money for southern desegregation programs.

The Freedom Fund made effective use of African American celebrities. It hired Marguerite Belafonte (wife of performer Harry Belafonte) as its director and formed connections with celebrities such as baseball hero Jackie Robinson, singer Lena Horne, composer and band leader Duke Ellington, and civil rights leader Rosa Parks. A major event in the Freedom Fund Campaign was an annual Freedom Fund Dinner, which attracted a mix of financial benefactors and celebrities of all races. The records of the dinners from 1957 through 1965 are rich in correspondence files with letters from celebrities regarding the NAACP's program and the civil rights movement.

Correspondents include radio host Steve Allen; scholars Benjamin Mays and Ralph Bunche; singers Harry Belafonte, Nat King Cole, Sammy Davis Jr., and Marian Anderson; baseball greats Roy Campanella, Willie Mays, and Jackie Robinson; civil rights attorneys Max Delson, Morris Milgram, and Patricia Roberts Harris; U.S. Representative Charles Diggs and Senators Wayne Morse and John F. Kennedy; musicians Billy Strayhorn, Toots Shor, and Duke Ellington; boxer Sugar Ray Robinson; and Eleanor Roosevelt.

The "Freedom TV Spectacular" series provides the background files on a televised entertainment program the NAACP organized in 1964. These files are also filled with correspondence of performing arts celebrities, including Dick Gregory, Burt Lancaster, Lena Horne, Bill Cosby, Elizabeth Taylor, Richard Burton, and many more.

The "Fund Raising" file series highlights the enormous contributions made to the NAACP by the African American fraternal organization Links, Inc. This organization of mostly black professionals documents the importance of the African American middle class in sustaining the NAACP. On Reel 24, frame 0176 through Reel 25, frame 0506 is another significant file series on fund-raising. It pertains to Rev. Raymond Henderson, who began a major fund-raising campaign among his Los Angeles parishioners after returning from a trip through the South in 1958. He then worked out an agreement with the NAACP national office to head a national fund-raising tour among major churches in honor of the association's fiftieth anniversary. The "Henderson" file series documents his fund-raising efforts among churches across the United States.

The series of "Government" files provides an excellent range of documentation on civil rights as an issue in local, state, and federal government between 1956 and 1965. The local files are grouped under the subhead of "Cities" (Reel 18, frame 0569 through Reel 19, frame 0089), and they document the political assertiveness of African Americans on a wide range of issues, including fair housing and urban renewal programs, local

nondiscrimination ordinances, direct action campaigns such as sit-ins and demonstrations, protests against racially coded newspaper advertisements and crime reports, the operation of antipoverty programs, complaints about police behavior, and the establishment of local human relations agencies. Many of these files show local NAACP leaders at work in their communities.

The next subseries in the "Government" file is "Federal" (Reel 19, frame 0090 through Reel 21, frame 0510). The Federal files document NAACP efforts to influence numerous federal agencies in the interest of racial fairness as well as to influence Congress on various bills and legislative initiatives. The files on Federal Agencies cover the departments of Agriculture; Commerce; Defense; Health, Education and Welfare; Justice; Labor; Navy; and State. Other agencies include the U.S. Information Agency, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, the Office of Economic Opportunity (and its predecessor, the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity), the Peace Corps, and the Veterans Administration. NAACP efforts pertain to assuring racial fairness in the formulation of policies, establishing programs that target African American populations, and providing employment opportunities for African Americans within the respective agencies. For example, the NAACP brought the discriminatory practices of some labor unions to the attention of the Labor Department in the hope of influencing its policies. The NAACP pressed for representation of African Americans and other minorities on regulatory and advisory boards. It also complained about the appointment of persons with known racist inclinations to policy-level positions. There is a separate subseries of files on the NAACP's (ultimately successful) efforts to have a permanent Department of Housing and Urban Development created.

The "Legislation" subseries of files documents NAACP efforts to influence Congress. These files do not focus on the campaign to enact the Civil Rights and Voting Rights laws of 1964 and 1965. (Those legislative campaigns are documented in UPA's microform publication *Papers of the NAACP, Part 21: Relations with the Modern Civil Rights Movement*.) Instead they document a wide range of legislative proposals, such as restrictions on the right of *habeas corpus* (which the NAACP opposed), social security reform, opposition to the death penalty and to the Bricker immigration law amendment, veterans' legislation, equal employment opportunity legislation, abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee, and various antidiscrimination riders to federal laws.

The "State" subseries of the "Government" files (Reel 21, frame 0511 through Reel 22, frame 0289) is arranged alphabetically. It documents NAACP activities among numerous state legislatures, executive agencies, and local interest groups. Among the most common topics is the creation or strengthening of state civil rights statutes. Some states' files document NAACP activity in electoral politics, supporting civil rights advocates or

opposing those perceived to be hostile to the movement. The New York State files are by far the most voluminous. They are in turn subdivided into "Assembly and Senate," "Department of Labor," and "Governors." They document NAACP involvement in many issues, including abolition of the death penalty, reform of welfare programs, design of police training programs, fair housing programs, employment discrimination, consumer protection, and various antidiscrimination initiatives.

The next large series concerns the documentation of racial bigotry and right-wing reaction to the civil rights movement. The largest file on this subject is "Hate Materials," beginning on frame 0001 of Reel 23 and running through frame 0175 of Reel 24. This file contains racist and anti-NAACP literature from a wide range of sources, some emanating from organizations and some from individuals. A major theme in many of the attacks is the attempt to link the civil rights movement with communists. The file therefore also serves as a source of information on crude anticommunism in the cold war era. There is a separate file under the "Hate Materials" series for Clennon King, an African American and former member of the Board of Directors of the NAACP who advocated racial segregation. There is also a separate file on "White Supremacists," containing a concentration of material on the Ku Klux Klan and neo-Nazi groups. Just before the "Hate Materials" series is a separate file on right-wing evangelist Billy James Hargis (Reel 22, frames 0784 through 0863). There are also scattered materials on the racist right in the file on Ruth Haefner (Reel 22, frames 0606 through 0756). Haefner was a Portland, Oregon-based church leader and NAACP member who informed the national office about political currents in Oregon.

A major case of employment discrimination by the International Hod Carriers Union in New York City is documented in the file series on Orville Hughes at Reel 25, frame 0537 through Reel 26, frame 0067. For some reason this case was not filed with similar labor discrimination cases in the file series "Labor," which has been microfilmed by UPA as *Papers of the NAACP, Part 13: The NAACP and Labor, 1956-1965*. Researchers should consult that edition for further information on NAACP actions to combat employment discrimination.

Three important minority groups are covered in files on "Indians of North America" (Reel 26, frames 0057 through 0119), "Japanese Americans" (Reel 26, frames 0153 through 0205), and "Jews" (Reel 26, frames 0206 through 0491). The "Indians of North America" file notes the opposition of Indians in North Carolina to Ku Klux Klan activities in that state. There is also information about school segregation of Indians in western states and material regarding federal policies toward Indian nations. The "Japanese Americans" file includes materials on the Japanese American Citizens League (JACL), a civil rights organization modeled somewhat along the lines of the NAACP. The JACL was especially notable for successfully advocating

the elimination of the last vestiges of the oriental exclusion sections of American immigration law. The JACL also worked to eliminate local and state laws that sanctioned discrimination against Japanese persons.

The "Jews" series contains information on southern Jews' opposition to segregation, New York Jews' reactions to school desegregation in New York, and reports on anti-Semitism in the Soviet Union. An especially important vein of material concerns the efforts of NAACP leaders to curtail anti-Semitic impulses among African Americans. A great deal more information on the relationship between the NAACP and the Jewish community can be found in several subseries of the "Leagues and Organizations" file group described below, namely in the following subseries: American Council for Judaism, American Jewish Committee, American Jewish Congress, Jewish Labor Committee, and National Conference of Christians and Jews.

A single file on "Intelligence of Congressmen Who Signed the 'Southern Manifesto' as Measured by IQ Tests" (Reel 26, frames 0120 through 0143) contains an analysis of World War I-era intelligence tests administered to southern congressmen who served in the Army. The compilation was made by Dr. Horace Mann Bond, and the results provided the NAACP with public relations information with which to embarrass southern congressional defenders of segregation.

The "Kennedy" series (Reel 26, frames 0519 through 0910) includes files on both Jacqueline and John F. Kennedy. Three large files on John F. Kennedy are very rich in documenting the relationship between Senator and later President Kennedy and the NAACP. The bulk of material pertains to the Kennedy presidential administration. Included are efforts of the NAACP to influence Kennedy appointments, opposing those perceived to be hostile to the civil rights movement such as William Fullbright as secretary of state, while supporting those the association believed would show racial fairness, such as Dr. Benjamin E. Mays as a U.S. civil rights commissioner. There is correspondence with the administration about establishing executive-level civil rights agencies such as the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity, requests for executive orders against discrimination in housing and discrimination in federal employment, requests for federal protection in securing voting rights in the South, and requests for federal assistance to African American children shut out of schools in Prince Edward County, Virginia. There are also pleas for federal intervention in racial violence in Birmingham, Alabama, in 1963, including the notorious church bombing that killed four children. Because many of these pleas went unheeded, the "Miscellaneous" files contain many criticisms of the Kennedy administration.

The "Leagues and Organizations" component of the NAACP collection (Reel 27, frame 0189 through Reel 33, frame 0925) documents the association's relationship with many organizations interested in civil rights. Most of those organizations' files that were selected for this edition are

groups with which the NAACP maintained an active, cooperative relationship. The majority of files that were not selected contain no evidence of an active, ongoing relationship; instead their files indicate that they merely mailed unsolicited publicity materials to the NAACP. Many of the organizations selected for this edition are also represented in UPA's *Papers of the NAACP, Part 18: Special Subjects, 1940–1955*, and researchers may want to consult those files for earlier materials.

Listed below are descriptions of the files found in the Leagues and Organizations series.

The *American Civil Liberties Union* (Reel 27, frames 0189 through 0256) file features NAACP participation in the Lasker Civil Liberties Award, joint NAACP-ACLU protests against the House Un-American Activities Committee, and the establishment of an ACLU southern regional office in Atlanta, Georgia. One especially interesting matter is the discussion between the two organizations over the NAACP expulsion of a local branch leader for advocating violent reprisals against whites.

American Committee on Africa (Reel 27, frames 0257 through 0437) is an organization that was dedicated to educating Americans about the legitimacy of colonial liberation struggles and the aspirations of African nations. It sponsored American tours for African political leaders and exchange student programs involving African students. It secured NAACP sympathy for persecuted African leaders and joined with the NAACP in opposition to South African apartheid.

The American Council for Judaism (Reel 27, frames 0438 through 0459) was an anti-Zionist Jewish organization with which the NAACP apparently enjoyed cordial relations. The file documents an attack on the ACFJ by the Zionist American Committee. The NAACP demurred from involvement in the controversy.

American Friends Service Committee (Reel 27, frames 0460 through 0545) is the social service organization of the Quaker congregation. The AFSC was active in the South during the high tide of civil rights work in places such as Little Rock, Arkansas; Prince Edward County, Virginia; and points across Louisiana and Mississippi. In the northern states (especially Pennsylvania) the AFSC worked for fair housing and employment policies. As a pacifist organization, the AFSC was also active in world peace and antiwar politics.

The American Jewish Committee (Reel 27, frames 0546 through 0841) became one of the most powerful Jewish organizations in America during the 1950s and 1960s. It was modeled somewhat on the NAACP as both a protection and an advocacy group for Jewish interests. Because Jews were frequently subject to many of the same types of discrimination in housing and employment as African Americans, the AJC was a staunch political ally of the NAACP in battling racial discrimination in American society. The several large files on this organization document AJC campaigns against housing and

employment discrimination as well as on behalf of religious freedoms and civil liberties.

The American Jewish Congress (Reel 27, frame 0842 through Reel 28, frame 0411) was an older Jewish advocacy group that fought many of the same battles as did the AJC against discrimination, especially in housing and employment. Both organizations joined with the NAACP under the umbrella organization of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights in the interest of lobbying for federal civil rights legislation. Both organizations took a pro-Zionist position, and their files accordingly contain material on foreign affairs, especially Soviet persecution of Jews.

American Negro Leadership Conference on Africa (Reel 28, frame 0412 through Reel 29, frame 0174) was an organization dedicated to influencing U.S. foreign policy toward Africa. It was established in 1962 and brought together the leaders of the major American civil rights groups, the NAACP, the Congress on Racial Equality, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the National Council of Negro Women, the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, and the National Urban League. The several large files on this organization document NAACP involvement in its founding, work on student exchanges, opposition to South African apartheid, and promotion of African cultural achievements. Of particular interest are efforts to strengthen ties between African American student civil rights workers and African students elsewhere around the world. The series is also valuable for information about African views of the civil rights movement in the United States. There are records on the group's efforts to influence the policies of the U.S. State Department, information on fund-raising efforts, and copies of financial statements.

The American Society of African Culture (Reel 29, frames 0214 through 0277) focused on bringing an appreciation of African culture to America. It was headed by Horace Mann Bond, president of Lincoln University. Like the American Negro Leadership Conference on Africa and the American Committee on Africa, it sponsored exchange programs in academia between the United States and Africa. It pressed for the employment of African Americans in the U.S. Department of State and promoted the inclusion of African history in American public school curricula.

Americans for Democratic Action (Reel 29, frames 0278 through 0598) was a pillar of the post-World War II anticommunist left. The group allied with the NAACP both on questions of curtailing communist influence in the United States and on behalf of federal civil rights legislation.

The Committee on Civil Rights in East Manhattan (Reel 29, frames 0599 through 0816) was an organization of local civic, religious, and welfare groups in New York that focused on effectuating racial integration in public accommodations (such as restaurants) and in housing. It provides an

excellent example of a grassroots effort to prevent state civil rights legislation from becoming a dead letter.

The *Du Bois Memorial Committee* (Reel 29, frames 0854 through 0875) and the *Eleanor Roosevelt Memorial Foundation* (Reel 29, frames 0876 through 1025) were efforts to memorialize two of the twentieth century's greatest civil rights leaders. The Du Bois Committee records are brief and apparently led to a single conference in honor of the deceased leader in 1964. The Roosevelt Memorial Foundation worked toward the establishment of an ongoing program, including public service awards, a leadership training program, and an academic center at New York University. The files also document the production of a film biography of Eleanor Roosevelt. There is a reminiscence on Eleanor Roosevelt by Roy Wilkins.

Freedom House was, like Americans for Democratic Action, an influential liberal anticommunist organization that took a major interest in the civil rights movement. Roy Wilkins, Channing Tobias, and Ralph Bunche of the NAACP served on the board of directors. The files, found at Reel 30, frames 0001 through 0786, document a wide range of activities in support of civil rights initiatives as well as liberal anticommunist foreign policy.

Imhotep National Conference (Reel 30, frame 0838 through Reel 31, frame 0184), named for the ancient Egyptian physician, was an organization devoted to desegregation of hospitals. It was formed by a coalition of the NAACP, the association of black surgeons (Medico-Chirurgical Society), and black physicians' organization (National Medical Association). The group met annually to assess the progress and problems in desegregating American hospitals. It worked to combat discrimination against the admission and in the treatment of African American patients, the hiring of African American physicians, and the training and hiring of African American nurses and staff. The conferences included physicians, nurses, hospital administrators, and civil right leaders. It provided an important link between the NAACP and black medical professionals.

Jewish Labor Committee (Reel 31, frames 0207 through 0293) is one of the several Jewish organizations that joined with the NAACP in the cause of civil rights. Like the American Jewish Congress and the American Jewish Committee, discussed above, the JLC joined the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights to press for federal civil rights legislation beginning in the 1950s. Although a northern-based organization, the JLC took an active interest in the struggle for desegregation in the South. More information on the collaboration of this group with the NAACP can be found in the files on the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights in UPA's *Papers of the NAACP, Part 21: NAACP Relations with the Modern Civil Rights Movement*.

The *John Birch Society* (Reel 31, frames 0294 through 0354) file documents the NAACP's concerns about this aggressive super-patriotic and anticommunist organization. The file contains a history of the John Birch

Society (founded in 1958) written by an assistant attorney general of the California Department of Justice. There is also material from local NAACP leaders on John Birch Society influence in their communities.

National Association of Intergroup Relations Officials (Reel 31, frames 0447 through 0664) was an organization dedicated to eradication of prejudice and discrimination against persons of all colors and creeds in America. It took special interest in problems confronted by Latinos and Jews as well as by African Americans and took a sympathetic interest in the civil rights movement of the 1950s and 1960s. It was composed of officials from both public and private organizations dealing with human relations. Roy Wilkins served on its board of directors.

Smaller files of organizational records on Reel 31 include *National Alliance of Postal Employees* (Reel 31, frames 0424 through 0446), which was a historically black postal workers union that fought discrimination both in the postal service and among postal unions. The National Alliance joined with the NAACP and the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights in pressing for federal civil rights legislation. Another small but significant file is *National Catholic Conference for Interracial Justice* (Reel 31, frames 0665 through 0707). This file documents the cooperation of Catholic churchmen with the civil rights movement. *The National Civil Liberties Clearing House* (Reel 31, frames 0708 through 0777) was a civil liberties organization that the NAACP cooperated with. *The National Committee on Immigration and Citizenship* (Reel 31, frames 0778 through 0817) solicited NAACP support for the reform of racist immigration laws. *The National Community Relations Advisory Council* (Reel 31, frames 0818 through 0846) worked with the NAACP on devising local community programs especially for children and youths.

The National Conference on Christians and Jews (Reel 31, frame 0847 through Reel 32, frame 0148) includes the files on one of the major pillars of the civil rights movement. Like many of the other organizations in this series, the NCCJ joined the NAACP in the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights for federal civil rights legislation. Aside from its assistance in the Congress, the NCCJ took an interest in southern civil rights struggles and assisted the NAACP in local community relations.

The *National Council of Churches* (Reel 32, frames 0149 through 0245) file documents the efforts of another church-based coalition to lead American church congregations to the pro-integration side of the American racial confrontations of the 1950s and 1960s. The council assisted in raising the issue of racism among church-based social welfare agencies. It took an interest in direct action programs toward desegregation in the South. It also took an interest in decolonization and international affairs.

The *National Council of Negro Women* (Reel 32, frames 0246 through 0367) file documents the activities of the dynamic coalition of black women's organizations headquartered in Washington, D.C. During the 1960s the

NCNW became exceptionally adept at providing local-level conduits for federal programs, particularly in housing and urban revitalization. The file also details some of the NCNW's work on southern civil rights causes.

The *National Sharecroppers Fund* (Reel 32, frames 0368 through 0516) file documents the plight of African American agricultural workers in the 1950s and 1960s. By this time many farm workers were subject to migrant work regimens that were rife with patterns of abuse and exploitation. The file documents NAACP cooperation in efforts to extend federal legal protections to this vulnerable population and to network farm workers with federal antipoverty programs.

National Social Welfare Assembly (Reel 32, frames 0517 through 0605) was an organization of welfare providers that took a keen interest in the cause of civil rights. The organization worked to train welfare professionals in the problems of American racism. It also took an interest in the direct action campaigns of civil rights leaders in the South.

The National Urban League (Reel 32, frames 0606 through 1104) was, along with the NAACP itself, one of the oldest and most politically effective civil rights organizations in America. While the NAACP displayed a consistent militancy in its quest for racial justice, the Urban League more quietly tended to the settlement and economic advancement of African Americans in urban centers throughout the country. As a result of the tensions that arose during the civil rights demonstrations in the South, the southern Urban Leagues became targets of racist hostility in some southern cities, and the files document these situations. The Urban League provided one of the most forceful and consistent voices for federal antipoverty and housing programs. It worked to implement the programs that were established to meet the needs of impoverished city dwellers. And it joined with the NAACP in the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights to press for full federal civil rights legislation. The National Urban League files are valuable for information about housing and labor conditions endured by many African Americans in the 1950s and 1960s.

New York Civil Liberties Union (Reel 33, frames 0001 through 0020) and *Peace with Freedom* (Reel 33, frames 0021 through 0087) are small files that document important elements of the NAACP's scope of activities in the 1960s. The former file documents complaints against New York City police for brutality and violations of civil rights. The latter file documents the NAACP's (in particular Roy Wilkins's) interest in foreign affairs.

The *Phelps-Stokes Fund* (Reel 33, frames 0088 through 0119) file documents the interest of this important foundation in African affairs and its support of the American Negro Leadership Conference on Africa (see above for a description of the ANLCA). The *Planned Parenthood Federation of America* (Reel 33, frames 0120 through 0133) file briefly documents some points of cooperation and points of tension between the NAACP and the birth control movement. *Public Education Association* (Reel 33, frames 0134

through 0289) pertains mostly to school desegregation and adequate facilities in New York City. *Science Research Associates* (Reel 33, frames 0290 through 0305) concerns plans for a study comparing educational aptitudes of African American and Caucasian students. The *United Negro College Fund* (Reel 33, frames 0306 through 0351) file includes information on the NAACP's interest in maintaining all African American institutions of higher learning in the wake of the association's desegregation of schools. *United States Committee for the United Nations* (Reel 33, frames 0352 through 0392) documents NAACP support for the UN. The *United States National Student Association* (Reel 33, frames 0393 through 0425) file contains information on the interest of youths in the sit-in and "Freedom Rides" movements and other aspects of direct action tactics on behalf of civil rights. *Women's International League for Peace and Freedom* (Reel 33, frames 0426 through 0482) documents this long-standing pacifist organization's embrace of the civil rights movement and of the NAACP in particular. *Workers Defense League* (Reel 33, frames 0483 through 0528) documents the close relationship between this organization and the NAACP. The Workers Defense League was modeled on the NAACP as a legal redress organization. Roy Wilkins served on its executive board, and it joined the NAACP in challenging discrimination in the workplace. *World Conference of Negro Writers and Artists* (Reel 33, frames 0529 through 0543) pertains to an incident of communist involvement in the politics of anticolonialism and to a conference on African culture. The *World Peace Association* file (Reel 33, frames 0544 through 0593) documents the efforts of a pacifist organization to align itself with the NAACP in the cause of civil rights. *Young Adult Council* (Reel 33, frames 0594 through 0716) documents the efforts of an especially energetic and effective youth organization on behalf of civil rights and NAACP efforts to dissociate the youth movement from communist influences.

The Young Men's Christian Association (Reel 33, frames 0717 through 0887) enjoyed a long relationship with the NAACP. There were constant problems with segregation and discrimination in local YMCAs, however, especially in the South. This lengthy file documents joint efforts of the YMCA and NAACP national offices to effect desegregation throughout the organization. The file on the *Young Women's Christian Association* (Reel 33, frames 0888 through 0925) completes the "Leagues and Organizations" series. This file documents the cooperation between the YWCA and the NAACP, including YWCA involvement in the 1963 March on Washington.

Two additional files were added to this edition after its announcement. The file on *Lee, Davis (Editor, "The Herald," South Carolina)* (Reel 33, frames 0926 through 1029) involves a libel case against the NAACP by Lee. Davis Lee defended segregation in the editorial columns of his newspaper and took umbrage at NAACP allegations about his motivations. The *Library of Congress* (Reel 33, frames 1030 through 1041) file documents the arrangement for depositing the NAACP archive at the library.

This microfilm has been produced from the NAACP collection at the Manuscripts Division of the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. All files in this edition come from Group III of the NAACP collection, 1956–1965.
