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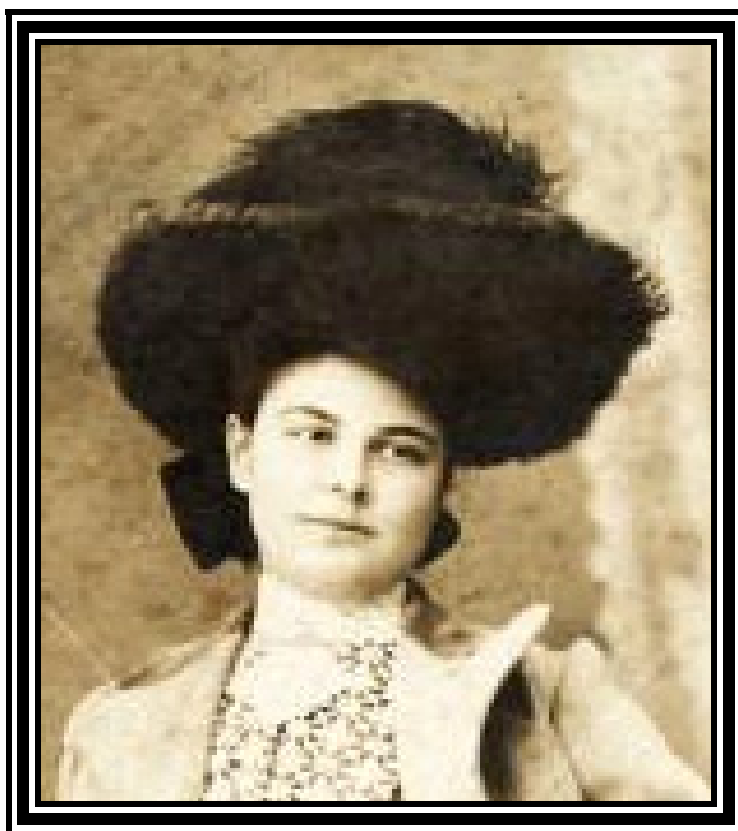

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SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Collections in *Part 2 of the New England Women and Their Families in the 18th and 19th Centuries: Personal Papers, Letters, and Diaries, Series B: Manuscript Collections from the Newport Historical Society* have been selected by Dr. Ellen K. Rothman. These collections are a combination of diaries, correspondence, and other papers from both male and female members of families. Topics covered are family and social life, religious faith, and death, including the deaths of family members and friends in a shipwreck and from other causes. Most of these families are from the upper middle and upper classes and have the financial means for private education, travel, and living abroad. Seven family collections compose Part 2 of *Series B: Manuscript Collections from the Newport Historical Society*: Carpenter Family Papers, 1741–1794; Abigail Church Papers, 1717; Fannie R. Clarke Diaries, 1864–1898; Hopkins Family Letters, 1725–1804; Hunter Family Papers, 1789–1940; Hunter-Dunn Family Papers, 1850–1956, King Family Papers, 1745–1901, and Sarah Osborne Papers, 1753–1948.

Within the King Family there are three David King names that are David King Sr., David King Jr., and the grandson, David King. Some correspondents have not been indexed because only a first name appears.

Following are descriptions of the collections included in Part 2 of Series B from the Newport Historical Society.

Carpenter Family Papers

The Carpenters were a business family from Newport, Rhode Island. There are letters to **Elizabeth Carpenter** from her mother and friends as well as business correspondence (1741–1794) and an account book from 1748 permitting a rare glimpse into the finances of an eighteenth-century businesswoman in Newport. There are business correspondence and papers of **Jabez Carpenter**, including an old receipt book presented to the Southern Cabinet of the Rhode Island Historical Society by daughter-in-law Anne Carpenter. The receipt book contains the autographs of many of the principle merchants that did business in Newport from the years 1743 to 1753 (Reel 1, Frame 0026). Merchant Jabez Carpenter did retail business with other merchants, such as Peleg Peckham, Johathan Nichols, David Cheseborough, Jonthan Chase, Benjamin Davis, Stephen Goddard, James Coggeshall, James Hayden, and Abigail Sanford to name a few.

Abigail Church Papers

The Abigail Church Papers from year 1717 contain poetry to Abigail from Nathaniel Clap (Reel 2, Frame 0623). Much of the writing pertains to religious sentiments of Abigail Church.

Fanny R. Clarke Diaries

The Fanny R. Clarke Diaries compose a personal account consisting of daily entries rich with joys and hardships of the life of a housewife and mother in Brooklyn, New York, and Newport, Rhode Island. The collection spans the years 1864–1898 and comprises twenty-six diaries from Reel 2, Frame 0644 to Reel 7, Frame 0418.

Henry and **Fanny R. Clarke** had seven children: sons Willie, Audley, and Oscar, and daughters Cassie, Cara, Harriet, and Jessie. Son Audley married Louie and had three children, Reginald, Helen, and Gerald Berts. On December 27, 1897, Fanny wrote “Audley’s children were here all good & pleasant, such happy little creatures” (Reel 7, Frame 0400).

The Clarkes lived in the family home in Brooklyn, New York, and while Henry worked at the bank, the family split their time between Brooklyn and Newport. A diary entry written by Fanny after her arrival at Newport from Brooklyn reads: “A letter today from my dear Henry. What a darling good husband he is, my love strengthens as the years roll on and I am never happy when separated from home” (Reel 2, Frame 0937).

Later they divided time between Brooklyn and their cottage on a farm on Conanicut Island, Rhode Island, the Clarke home in Newport, and Providence. Henry Clarke worked at the Bank of America in New York. (He later became a director at the Bank of Rhode Island.). Always concerned that Henry was not rewarded for his dedication and work at the bank, Fanny wrote, “Henry went to the Bank today; found an accumulation of work & that Dallas Pratt had been appointed as Cashier & this is a gross piece of injustice and makes us all feel uncomfortable. Henry has served the Bank faithfully over 30 years & deserved the place!” (Reel 4, Frame 0204) Fanny later wrote again about her feelings for her husband: “My precious Husband is the best gift!—every year my love and respect for him increases” (Reel 3, Frame 0475).

When **Henry Clarke** resigned from the bank in New York, he built a cottage on Conanicut Island near the family farm. Fanny wrote, “Went to the farm first time since we came to the Island.... It was a pleasant day and everything lovely, the old house much better than I expected to see it, and the new house progressing finely” (Reel 4, Frame 0678). After the sale of their house in Brooklyn, the Clarkes rented in Brooklyn in the winter and spent their summers at their home on Conanicut Island, packing and putting things in storage before moving from one place to the other. While at the home on Conanicut Island, Fanny wrote, “This is the 24th anniversary of my marriage. I never thought to find myself living on a farm in Conanicut!” (Reel 4, Frame 0733) She was saddened by leaving their family home and having to rent a place each winter when they returned to Brooklyn. While in New York the children were often taken to Coney Island, Central Park, Staten Island, and shopping.

There are accounts of life at the Conanicut cottage, such as the activities of Henry and Audley: “Henry went to the farm this morning. Aud went to Newport with the butter first time this morning. He had to sell it from door to door, got 25 cts for it”; “Henry bought a bull named Gen Grant for \$40...to be delivered tomorrow” (Reel 4, Frames 0669 and 0670).

After the Clarkes moved to Conanicut Island, Henry Clarke became engaged in the Beaver Tail Ferry business. Fanny R. Clarke recorded in her diaries dividends from Manhattan Gas and other utility companies. The Clarke children attended Friends School in Providence as well as private schools in Brooklyn and Newport.

Wherever the Clarkes were living, they went to church quite regularly. One of Fanny Clarke’s diary accounts read: “Went to Trinity Church all day, took Cassie in the afternoon. She laughed out loud and I had to take (her) out” (Reel 2, Frame 0962). On another occasion when Oscar was three years old, she wrote: “Ascension Day. Took Oscar to church first time this morn—communion service. He was disappointed at not ‘seeing God’ said if this is God’s House why isn’t He at home?” (Reel 4, Frame 0263)

There are seven years when there are no diaries for Fanny R. Clarke. Throughout the diaries are accounts of the children’s illnesses. In her last entries for 1871, Fanny Clarke wrote about the children getting whopping cough. This might be the reason for the lack of diaries after this time. The following is the first entry in her 1878 diary: “This is our dear Willie’s Birthday, he would have been 13 years old. It is five years since he left us; He was born on Epiphany the Oriental Christmas and died on the 25th of December the day we celebrate as Christmas” (Reel 3, Frame 0415). Later in her diaries she wrote: “Ten years ago tonight my precious Willie died & with him my Christmas” (Reel 4, Frame 0181). Every year she made note of this in her diary. Another entry reveals the death of her daughter Cassie: “Two years today since my darling Cassie left us, the miss today is greater & the grief is deeper than then” (Reel 3, Frame 0438).

Fanny Clarke often wrote about her great sufferings from rheumatism and being diagnosed with congestion of the veins (Reel 3, Frame 0715): “Began second bottle of Lidya Pinkhams medicine. Hands & feet terribly swollen, growing steadily worse. God help me” (Reel 3, Frame 0757). Her son

Oscar showed concern for his mother's health as is revealed in this entry: "Oscar prayed last Night—O! God! Please make my mother well and I will be very much obliged to you" (Reel 4, Frame 0580).

Fanny Clarke's physical sufferings and the deaths of her children made her sensitive to others' needs: "If we have once known any great sorrow, a sympathetic chord is established in our hearts which must vibrate at the sight of others' griefs, sorrow like the great leveler death, breaks down all social barriers" (Reel 4, Frame 0145). In another entry she wrote: "Busy making a cloak for a poor little baby whose mother brings it here begging" (Reel 4, Frame 0572).

Most of the burdens that Fanny Clarke carried involved her health condition and the memories of the loss of her children and brother as well as the resignation of Henry from the Bank of America in New York. The thought of selling their family home in Brooklyn saddened her greatly. Referring to the previous year, at the beginning of her 1885 diary she wrote: "The most eventful & trying year of my life" (Reel 4, Frame 0590).

In 1883 Fanny wrote: "Cara became a woman today poor child! She has little idea of what trials this will probably bring upon her" (Reel 4, Frame 0378). This statement proved to be prophetic as **Cara Clarke** was to bring much grief upon the family. On December 31, 1892, Fanny wrote: "A most eventful year closes tonight. Audley's marriage the 1st break in the family & the greatest ever I could sustain. Oscar's recovery after a 5 months illness & a surgical operation is a blessing to be recorded, great distress & anxiety caused by the behavior of our daughter Cara & the end is not yet? Harriet & Jessie are our pride & comforts" (Reel 6, Frame 0197).

In addition to Fanny's health condition, Cara is of much concern to her parents as detailed in diary entries on Reels 6 and 7. Fanny sends one dollar every few days for laundry and incidentals and occasionally a trunk of clothes to Cara. Following are some remarks concerning Cara from Fanny's diaries:

"Had a talk with dear Henry on a disturbing subject which nearly broke our hearts" (Reel 6, Frame 0243).

"Letter from Dr. Miller & Mr. Straats, Cara past the Crisis at noon today.... Annie & I went to Elizabeth today to see Cara, found her quite sick, it was a damp day & most fatiguing journey" (Reel 6, Frame 0286); "Cara's failure has sadden our lives!" (Reel 6, Frame 0302)

"Harriet & Jessie arrived from N.Y. this morn by the early boat—Oscar went down to meet them, they are well & as happy to get home as we are to have them, but the missing one saddens our hearts" (Reel 6, Frame 0317); "Sent Cara 6 bibs" (Reel 6, Frame 0331).

"I took Annie & went to Elizabeth today to see Cara, we reached there about 1 o'clock & left quarter of four, it was a pleasant day & I had a satisfactory visit in some respects but it was so sad to leave my child among strangers out of a home. She is behaving well & bearing her cross cheerfully!" (Reel 6, Frame 0394)

1893— "This has been a memorable year, the birth of our first grandchild—and the loss of our oldest daughter under a cloud, out of the home, this is a hidden sorrow & more bitter in consequence" (Reel 6, Frame 0416).

"Cara sent—\$1, had distressing news of her through Mrs. Mitchel, she has been misbehaving" (Reel 7, Frame 0089); "Letter from Cara & Miss Prendeville. Cara past the crisis yesterday morning the 28th" (Reel 7, Frame 0234); "Letter from Miss P. a relief from one anxiety she told me of" (Reel 7, Frame 0236); "Sept-28 sent Cara \$2 for merino shirts for G." (Reel 7, Frame 0355).

“This is my Birthday, no one but Cara remembered it! The banished child! She sent me tokens of love in her needle work. I wrote Cara. Sent her \$1. I am more feeble than ever before & it is very difficult for me to get about, no one seems to realize it” (Reel 7, Frame 0501).

“Cara’s Birthday, a wayward child! Who has caused us much sorrow, 30 years old today & her life spoiled by it” (Reel 7, Frame 0518).

Toward the end of the Fanny R. Clarke Diaries Fanny became more incapacitated. At times it was so difficult for her to walk that she had to crawl. During this period she appears to be depressed as she notes: “I have a terrible heartache today! My children are regardless of my feelings and all my love & patience & devotion to them for the best years of my life have been in vain! They cannot but realize this when I am gone. I would spare them the remorse if I could” (Reel 6, Frame 0538). Later she laments “I am feebler than ever & so forlorn looking! It mortified my dear husband” (Reel 7, Frame 0080). Fanny R. Clarke’s diary stopped when she no longer was capable of writing.

Hunter Family Papers

The long series of the Hunter family papers documents an important Newport family of the Congregational faith with three generations of women’s correspondence and diaries. Highlights include letters from Mary Hunter in Brazil and the correspondence she received from Newport friends and relatives in the mid-nineteenth century as well as letters from her to sister Abby Robinson Pierce (Reel 9, Frame 0879). These are complemented by letters of her mother and grandmother from an earlier time period and those of her daughters and granddaughters.

Dr. William Hunter was a physician and surgeon general to the Rhode Island troops. Dr. Hunter married Deborah Malbone, the daughter of Col. Godfrey Malbone of Newport in 1761. William and **Deborah Hunter** had a number of children that died at infancy. There are letters from Deborah Hunter written from England to Charles Feke, apothecary, and son of painter Robert Feke (Reel 7, Frames 0641–0683).

Dr. Hunter had three daughters, Elizabeth (1762–1849), Anna (1766–1859), and Catherine (1773–1860) who were highly accomplished and beautiful women. During the Revolution they were very much admired by the distinguished French officers who occupied Newport in 1780–1781.

In 1786, Mrs. Hunter went with her two oldest daughters to England in order to consult physicians about her daughter Elizabeth’s (Eliza) eyes. But nothing could avert the blindness, which, it is said, was brought on by constant weeping for a lost lover. She died unmarried aged 85 in the south of France. **Elizabeth Hunter** left her property, amounting to \$30,000, inherited from her mother, to her brother Hon. William Hunter.

Anna Hunter married a Swiss banker in Naples and died in Paris at the age of nearly 94 years. She has numerous descendants in Italy, Switzerland, France, and America.

Catherine Hunter married Count de Cadignan from the south of France. She had one son from whom are several descendants. She died in 1859.

Dr. Hunter had a son named **William Hunter** (1733–1849) who was both a lawyer and a senator and who became the representative of the United States as charge d’ affairs to the Empire of Brazil. William Hunter married Mary Robinson (1787–1863).

Mary Robinson’s father would not give consent to William Hunter to marry his daughter. In a letter to Mary, Hunter wrote: “He understands that I am to do everything I can to effect a marriage, and he will do everything to prevent it. He says that as to his after conduct towards us when married, he shall be governed by events. . . . He says he never can give his consent” (Reel 8, Frame 0223).

Mary Robinson had several love affairs before meeting William Hunter, and during this time there were other letters received from another suitor named Edwin. He wrote to Mary: “Small difficulties shall not stop me—your . . . true love, Edwin.” There was to be a romantic encounter with Edwin. Mary was to come with a handkerchief and meet Edwin or wave him off. While Edwin was trying to meet with Mary at a Robinson home (Reel 8, Frame 0233), William Hunter was asking Mary to elope by carriage (Reel 8, Frame 0234).

After William Hunter's marriage to Mary there were letters to and from Mary and William Hunter speaking of their children Elina, William (1806–1886), Mary (1811–1872), Thomas (1809–1890), Katherine (Kate) de Cardignan (1821–1846), Charles (1813–1873), and Godfrey Malbone (1823–1831). Letters were written by both brother William and mother Mary Hunter to Charles Hunter while on naval vessels. One letter from William to Charles tells of the father's senate promotion as minister plenipotentiary to Brazil (Reel 10, Frame 0844). The collection also contains letters from Mary Robinson Hunter to sister **Abby Robinson Pierce** (Reel 9, Frame 0879).

Charles Hunter served on several ships, including as captain of the *Montgomery*. The collection contains a detailed account of an encounter with the ship *Blanche*, and correspondence reflects the loss of rank over the incident. The *Montgomery* fired upon the *Blanche* because it was an enemy ship, and fireman James Speirs on the *Blanche* is quoted in correspondence: "We beached the *Blanche*. She was not set to before she touched—as soon as the *Montgomery* lowered her boats, then preparation was made to set fire to the ship. The *Blanche* was not set on fire till the boats neared her. Wood was packed in several parts of the vessel, among the cotton, so that she could be set fire to.... The scuttling I saw that done myself, and it was done before the men from the *Montgomery* got on board. The men of the *Montgomery* had nothing to do with the burning or scuttling of the vessel" (Reel 14, Frame 0080); "A great many shots were fired by the *Montgomery* before the *Blanche* hoisted any flag at all and when she did raise the flag, it was the English flag, and when they hoisted the Spanish flag, it was over the English" (Reel 14, Frame 0083). Charles Hunter was later reinstated to his former rank in the navy, and William Hunter sent his son the notification: "The Senate passed your Resolution yesterday, so you are all right" (Reel 14, Frame 0060).

William and Mary Hunter's daughter, Kate Hunter, married lawyer John Greenway and died after giving birth to **Charles Hunter Greenway** (1846–1881), who as an adult entered the English Navy. Kate Hunter Dunn is the daughter of Charles Hunter Greenway, who married Mary Rotch.

The William Hunter family was known in international society, and Kate was especially noticed as written in a newspaper clipping reporting an international ball on the French frigate *Hercules*: "Among those in attendance was an emperor who was twelve and a French prince. Foremost among the throng appeared the American Minister to Brazil; he wore his Court uniform, decidedly the most elegant in the room.... Mr. Hunter is a gentleman of the old school, one whose manners would grace any drawing room in Europe; his lady and daughters were with him, one of whom, 'Miss Kate,' ... is indeed most beautiful; I shall not attempt to describe her, as any thing I could say in her praise would be like gilding fine gold, or painting the lily. I was indeed proud that a daughter of America should have eclipsed the fair representatives of so many nations as were assembled at the ball" (Reel 11, Frame 0934).

Many grieved at the loss of Kate Hunter as revealed in the notice of her death and memorial: "To the memory of Kate de C[ardignan]. Hunter, Daughter of Hon. William Hunter of Newport, Rhode Island, United States, and the beloved wife of John Greenway, Esq., and English merchant of high standing in Montevideo—Born in Newport 27th of March 1821. Married in Rio de Janeiro 14 of Dec., 1842,—and at the age of 25, died in giving birth to a son in Montevideo, 15 April 1846. "The flags of all the English and American vessels then in port were at half mast, and the house of the English Minister was closed to all visitors" (Volume 15, Frame 0488). Kate's memorial read:

Young beautiful & beloved
None saw her but to love her
None named her but to praise
This stone is raised by her affectionate
Husband—
(Reel 11, Frame 0291)

Senator William Hunter spent a good portion of his career working to get a naval station at Newport, Rhode Island. "The President was particular, was gracious to me, beyond anything that

ever happened to me in the course of my whole life” (Reel 8, Frame 0915). Hon. William Hunter died in 1849.

Hunter-Dunn Family

Kate Hunter Dunn (1849–1930), daughter of Captain Charles Hunter and Mary Rotch Hunter of Newport, Rhode Island, married Thomas Dunn (1834–1916), whose family came from England. Thomas Dunn was the son of Dr. Theophilus Calhoun and Elizabeth Potter Dunn, of Newport Rhode Island. Thomas and Kate Dunn had three children: Dr. **Charles Hunter Dunn (Hunter)**, a physician in Boston; **Robert S. Dunn**, an explorer and writer in Mexico; and **Anna C. R. Dunn**. The collection contains correspondence between Kate Hunter Dunn and her sister, Anna F. Hunter. Other correspondence reveals Robert S. Dunn’s time spent with the navy: “Letter from Robert [S. Dunn] confirming his appointment to go to the Pacific with the fleet—He has seen the President himself” (Reel 33, Frame 0911).

Thomas Dunn was engaged in trade in China and for some years was a director of the Old Colony Railroad. Kate Hunter Dunn frequently mentioned in her diary that she worked on the “R R.” accounts. On February 15, 1908, she wrote “Finished at last the tabulating & summing up of the 1907 accounts” (Reel 34, Frame 0022).

Kate Hunter Dunn wrote in an amusing letter about a family engagement and marriage: “I suppose you have heard of Esther Hazard’s having found what she calls her ‘affinity,’ in the person of Dr. Dunning of N.Y., the famous dentist who has had two wives already, the first one being dead the second he is divorced from! He is a man fifty years of age. She is twenty! I make no comments, you will draw your own conclusions as to the mental condition of the Hazard family!!” (Reel 35, Frame 0010)

Thomas Dunn wrote interesting, informative, and often humorous letters in Reel 36 and writes a number of letters to Annie Dunn. In one letter he writes: “It is quite evident that your cousin C. has a very severe attack of what I should call Christian Science, with a Woman’s Emancipation–Higher-Education complication: She was disposed to air some of her new ideas to me; but I recommended a course of Spencer’s Biology, & Psychology.... Why will not your sex stick to their proper roles of Sweethearts, Wives, & Mothers, instead of pursuing such chimeras as “Higher-Educationists,” Artists, Women’s rights, & other impossible rubbish?” Thomas also wrote, “Howland Russell died last week, & from what I hear, his death must be a relief to all who know him; toward the end he became quite idiotic. Dr. Odell, also, has joined the ‘silent majority!’”; “A great honor has come to your family; Willie Hunter has been elected Vestryman of Trinity Church.... What a stretch of the imagination is required to see in John Hall, Pope Magill, & others, their prototypes, the fishermen of Galilee. Fancy Magill on a John the Baptist diet!!!!” (Reel 36, Frame 0202)

Captain and Mrs. Charles Hunter were going to Europe with their three daughters to spend the winter on the Riviera when the steamboat collided with another vessel. An account of the tragedy was later written: “Captain Hunter was overheard saying farewell to his daughter Mary: ‘I know that God will save you. I shall die, but there is something for you to do on earth.’... His two daughters who survived owed their lives to obeying their father’s command, ‘Seize this settee and do not let go of it under any circumstances whatever.’ Captain and Mrs. Hunter and their daughter Caroline (Cary) were gone. Mary (May) Hunter, who had lost her mother and father, said quietly that a religious service would be comforting.” Mary and Anna Hunter were sent to live with a member of the King family.

King Family Papers

David King Sr. was a physician, and this collection contains a ledger of medical office visits and treatments (Reel 39, Frame 0097). David King’s son, **David King Jr.**, married Sarah Gibbs, and they had sons **Theodore Wheaton**, **William Dehon King**, and **David King** who married Helen and had daughters **Georgiana Gordon King**, **Mary I. King Pomeroy**, **Annie Edith King**, and **Sarah Gibbs King Birkhead**. There are letters to and references of Aunt Annie and Uncle Edward.

David King Jr. was an assistant corresponding clerk living in China and wrote to his mother about business, property, mortgages, and shipping teas and silk to family in America. He had an interest in becoming a partner in the business and was hoping to earn it, showing disappointment when he did not. His mother shipped commodities such as pork, beef, and flour to him for trade. He wrote, “The American flag on a merchant ship is now rarely seen, at least no person will ship by a vessel under that flag, & the business of Americans is being done in Dutch, Bremen, & continental flags” (Reel 41, Frame 0514). David King Jr., who was also a doctor, later practiced medicine in Newport and married Sarah Wheaton.

David King Jr.’s son, Theodore Wheaton King, fought in the Civil War and “died in Philadelphia...while being removed to his home in this city, after having been severely wounded at the battle near Manassas, Virginia” (Reel 41, Frame 0428). He had been confined for several months as a prisoner of war at Richmond, Virginia.

Reels 40 and 41 contain Georgiana Gordon King’s diaries and papers. Georgiana King was a very talented woman, and her writings include diaries and journals, scenes for a play, stories, writings about Frederick II (Frederick the Great, King of Prussia), and writings in both the German and French languages. Referring to the first marriage in their family, she wrote: “Mama wrote a lovely letter to Helen her future charming daughter-in-law as Dave calls her” (Reel 40, Frame 0309).

Other relatives included in the collection are **Zebulon King**, husband of Deborah King and father of artist Charles Bird King who was killed by Indians at Marietta, Ohio, in 1789; **William Henry King**; **George Gordon King**, who wrote about a variety of issues, including the health and well being of his wife Lizzie King; **F. R. Rives**; **Matilda A. Rives** and daughter **Ella King**, who wrote letters to one another, and there is one letter from a young grandson, Philip King.

Sarah Osborne Papers

The **Sarah Osborne** Papers include journals in which she writes about her personal life, her concern for others, and her Christian religious faith. The collection also contains astrological readings and Abigail Greene’s “Lamentation over New England”; letters of **Mary Whitney Phienix** to her daughter Mary Caroline Phienix Warren; and the **Mary Stevens** social scrapbook concerning a young woman’s entry into Newport society, including etchings of buildings.

In this part of Series B researchers will find fascinating accounts of history, international society, travel, courtship, and marriage. The family’s tragedies and ecstasies involve the researcher in a very intimate way and allow researchers to experience them vicariously by reading the documents in this Rhode Island Historical Society collection.

SOURCE NOTE

The following index is an alphabetical listing of the principal correspondents in this microform publication. The first number after each entry refers to the reel, while the four-digit number following the colon refers to the frame number at which a particular file folder containing the document from the source begins. Hence, 42: 0001 directs the researcher to the folder that begins at Frame 0001 of Reel 42. By referring to the Reel Index, which constitutes the initial section of this guide, researchers will find a document list including folder titles and substantive issues by category in the order in which they appear in the film.

There are some names that might have been signed differently by the same individual, and in these cases the name is written as it was signed. What looks like a duplicate might also be a relative by the same name.

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This edition of *New England Women and Their Families in the 18th and 19th Centuries: Personal Papers, Letters, and Diaries* has been selected from the holdings of the Newport Historical Society by Dr. Ellen K. Rothman. These collections are a combination of diaries, correspondence, and other papers from both male and female members of families. Topics covered are family and social life, religious faith, and death, including the deaths of family members and friends in a shipwreck and from other causes. Most of these families are from the upper middle and upper classes and have the financial means for private education, travel, and living abroad.

Seven family collections compose Part 2 of *Series B: Manuscript Collections from the Newport Historical Society*: Carpenter Family Papers, 1741–1794; Abigail Church Papers, 1717; Fannie R. Clarke Diaries, 1864–1898; Hopkins Family Letters, 1725–1804; Hunter Family Papers 1789–1940; Hunter-Dunn Family Papers, 1850–1956, King Family Papers (1745–1901, and Sarah Osborne Papers (1753–1948).

The Carpenter Family Papers include letters to Elizabeth Carpenter from her mother and friends as well as business correspondence (1741–1794) and an account book from year 1748 permitting a rare glimpse into the finances of an eighteenth-century businesswoman in Newport.

The Fanny R. Clarke Diaries are a personal account consisting of daily entries rich with the joys and hardships of a housewife and mother in Brooklyn, New York, and Newport., Rhode Island. The collection spans the years 1864–1898 and comprises twenty-six diaries from Reel 2, Frame 0644 to Reel 7, Frame 0418.

Henry and Fanny R. Clarke had seven children: sons Willie, Audley, and Oscar, and daughters Cassie, Cara, Harriet, and Jessie. The Clarkes lived in the family home in Brooklyn, New York, and while Henry worked at Bank of America, the family split its time between Brooklyn and Newport and later between its cottage on the family farm on Conanicut Island, Rhode Island, and New York. Henry Clarke later became a director at the Bank of Rhode Island and ran a ferry business at Conanicut Island.

Most of the burdens that Fanny Clarke carried involved her severe rheumatism and the memories of the loss of her children, but the most difficult trial involved her wayward daughter, Cara, as revealed in her writing: “Had a talk with dear Henry on a disturbing subject which nearly broke our hearts” (Reel 6, Frame 0243); “Letter from Dr. Miller & Mr. Straats, Cara past the Crisis at noon today.... “Cara’s failure has saddened our lives!” (Reel 6, Frame 0302) ... “The banished child....” (Reel 7, Frame 0501).

The long series of the Hunter family papers documents an important Newport family with three generations of women’s correspondence and diaries. Dr. William Hunter had three daughters and one son, Charles Hunter. He had three beautiful daughters, one being Kate Hunter who charmed all who met her: “Miss Kate ... is indeed most beautiful; I shall not attempt to describe her, as any thing I could say in her praise would be like gilding fine gold, or painting the lily (Reel 11, Frame 0934). Many grieved the loss of Kate Hunter, when at the age of twenty-five she died giving birth to a son.

Charles and Mary Hunter died with their oldest daughter when their ship collided with another vessel on their way to Europe to spend the winter on the Riviera. Two younger daughters, Mary and Anna, survived and were sent to live with the King family.

In this part of Series B researchers will find fascinating accounts of history, international society, travel, courtship, and marriage. The family’s tragedies and ecstasies involve the researcher in a very intimate way and allow researchers to experience them vicariously by reading the documents in these Rhode Island Historical Society collections.
