GENERAL INTRODUCTION

PAPERS OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS, 1918-1974

"The history of the League is the autobiography of the enfranchised female sex in the United States," wrote political scientist Louise Young in 1952. The League of Women Voters occupies a unique place in American political and women's history. Its brand of intensive study, training for citizenship, and sophisticated political action show one direction that women took in public life after they won the vote in 1920. In communities across the nation, the League of Women Voters stimulated and legitimized women's political activism throughout the postsuffrage period.

The core of the League of Women Voters' philosophy was its belief in representative government and the responsibility of individual citizens to be active and informed participants in the democratic process. While voter information and citizenship training were the areas the public most readily associated with the League of Women Voters' imprimatur, from the very start the League had a broader agenda. Not only would women be informed voters, but they would work for the goals that they considered important in modern political life. Although the specific issues that the League has supported over the seven decades of its existence have changed, strong continuities exist, especially in the areas of international cooperation abroad and humanitarian social reform on the domestic front. The issue-oriented agenda, one not necessarily shared by typical male voters, suggests that many women brought different values and concerns to twentieth-century political life, a conclusion with wide-ranging implications for understanding modern political culture.

The League of Women Voters chose a distinctive route to achieve political influence: it was rigorously nonpartisan. While individual members were expected to enroll as registered voters and even participate in partisan politics, no League official could hold a political position while associated with the League. Yet nonpartisan was not necessarily nonpolitical. The League consistently took strong stands on the major governmental questions of the day and lobbied aggressively for causes it believed in, but only after rigorous study by the membership and the reaching of a consensus for action. Although the national board did not poll the membership every time it took action (neither did elected officials representing their constituents, they pointed out), the League never embraced an issue until it had been thoroughly studied by the membership and broad agreement reached about the proper stand to take.

The League of Women Voters offers a rich and complex institutional history, with each decade bringing new challenges as well as continuing responsibilities. The 1920s was the "start-up" decade, although the League hardly started from scratch, since it inherited the unfinished agenda of the woman suffrage movement. No less than sixty-nine items were singled out for action at the first convention in 1920. Through the Women's Joint Congressional Committee, a lobbying group of ten women's organizations chaired by L.W.V. president Maud Wood Park, newly enfranchised women won passage of the Sheppard-Towner Act in 1921--the first federally funded program for maternal and infant health--and the 1922 Cable Act, which guaranteed the citizenship rights of married women.

The National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA) had counted several million members, but barely more than 100,000 joined the League of Women Voters in the immediate aftermath of the suffrage victory. When former Ohio suffragist Belle Sherwin took over as the League's second president in 1924, she had to confront diminishing membership, red-baiting attacks

from conservative groups, and an ongoing debate about what the scope of the League should be. Sherwin continued the process begun by Maud Wood Park of getting the national organization on a sound institutional footing, mainly by vesting power in the National Board of Directors as well as in semi-autonomous standing committees, each with its own specialists and program. The original committees reflected the breadth of the issues suffragists planned to confront in modern political life: Women in Industry, Child Welfare, Social Hygiene, Uniform Laws Concerning Women, and Food Supply and Demand. By the 1930s, the standing committees had evolved into Government and its Operation, Child Welfare, Education, Economic Welfare, the Legal Status of Women, and International Cooperation.

The Great Depression of the 1930s gave a heightened sense of urgency to League activities, increasing citizen interest in the impact of government on daily lives and thus building a core of interest for League-type initiatives. New issues won L.W.V. support, including unemployment compensation and relief, Social Security, and the right of married women to work. In 1934 the new League president, former Minnesota L.W.V. state president Marguerite Wells, launched a multi-year campaign for a merit system in government appointments that culminated in civil service reform legislation in 1938 and 1940. Unfortunately, the League was forced to halve its already strained budget during the depth of the Depression, which limited its ability to respond to the crises of the 1930s.

During the 1920s and 1930s, one of the League's most distinctive characteristics was its internationalism, a thrust which often placed the group outside the mainstream of American isolationist foreign policy in the interwar period. The League, for example, endorsed American entry into the League of Nations in 1932, although it took twelve years of study and debate to arrive at that position. It opposed the neutrality legislation of 1935 to 1937, which limited U.S. efforts to support the victims of aggression and supported Franklin Roosevelt's lend-lease aid package to Great Britain in 1941. Within weeks of America's entry into World War II, the League identified as its major goal the participation of the United States in a postwar international organization. On the domestic front, it supported government efforts to curb inflation and lobbied for an equitable tax system to spread the burden of paying for the war. With democracy under attack throughout the world, the League felt that its commitment to citizenship and activism was more important than ever, and it pursued twin goals of encouraging home front patriotism while building support for the League of Women Voters' point of view.

The events surrounding World War II hastened a major structural change in the League of Women Voters. This major turning point in League history, which was ratified amidst controversy at the 1944 convention, was the result of several interrelated factors. The League had inherited its structure--whereby no individuals belonged to the National League of Women Voters, only state and local organizations--from the suffrage organization NAWSA. Such an unwieldy structure made it difficult for the national leadership to reach individual members directly, a disadvantage dramatically shown to President Marguerite Wells in 1941, when the National Board mobilized popular support for lend-lease.

This institutional bottleneck was compounded, in the minds of Wells and others, with another trend which cut to the core of the L.W.V.'s purpose. The entrenchment of the League's standing committees and departments encouraged an increasing tendency to study issues rather than act on them. The League was turning out specialists in fields such as child welfare or legal reform, rather than well-rounded citizens (generalists, as it were) who were eager to participate in community and national affairs. With the world engulfed by the forces of fascism and with democracy under attack, the League leadership realized the acute danger that a preoccupation with study could cause at a time in world history when action was clearly called for.

At the 1944 convention, the national leaders tried to win approval for structural reforms which would have facilitated their desire to integrate individual members into a broad network of action and responsibility. Yet the general membership was not happy with this shifting emphasis, especially with a plan to do away entirely with state leagues--long a major focus of power outside the national headquarters. A rebellion occurred on the convention floor, as delegates voted down the official slate and elected New York's Anna Lord Strauss as president instead. (Marguerite Wells had already announced her retirement.) While most delegates agreed that the League organization needed

reform, there was no clear consensus on how to proceed. It was a time of intense soul-searching about the structures and strategies that the League would employ in the upcoming postwar world.

During the six years of Strauss's tenure, as well as during the 1950s, the League worked to define and implement its purpose. In a reversal of pre-1944 practice, now only individuals joined the League, while no organizations did; members joined local and state leagues in addition to the national organization, which was renamed the League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS) in 1946. The standing committees and departments were abolished, and the League's program of action was shortened and simplified. The year 1957 saw the incorporation of the League of Women Voters Education Fund (LWVEF), which took over responsibility for providing members and the general public with information on candidates, platforms, and ways to participate in political life, while the LWVUS served as the political advocacy and membership organization.

Without a doubt, the issue to which the League of Women Voters gave the most attention in the postwar world was the United Nations, which it had supported since 1942. Under the presidencies of Percy Maxim Lee and Ruth S. Phillips, the League also devoted considerable time to the study of water resources, tax reform, executive powers, and the abuses of the loyalty-security program. In 1954, after intense debate, the League took a stand against the Bricker Amendment, which would have limited the power of the executive branch to make treaties.

As the League of Women Voters celebrated "Forty Years of a Great Idea" in 1960, it was not aware that it would soon be entering a decade of rapid change and reorientation. Spurred by the civil rights movement, a totally new item appeared on the agenda in 1964: equality of opportunity. This new topic led the League to consider, in turn, fair housing, educational and employment practices, and eventually, in 1972, to support the Equal Rights Amendment. By the mid 1960s, the League was studying reapportionment and whether the United States should formalize diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China. (The membership answered yes in 1969.) In 1970, it supported the direct election of the president and vice-president and in 1972 added environmental quality to its agenda.

This new activism, much of it spurred by the reform climate of the 1960s, caused (as in 1944) another round of intense debate over what kind of organization the League of Women Voters should be. Much of the prodding for the League to take stronger stands came from an activist national board headed by President Lucy Wilson Benson. The national calls for greater involvement and action were met in some, but not all, local communities with agreement, as many women responded to the quickened pace of social change in the late 1960s with a personal desire to do more. Yet others were more accustomed to the League's old way of doing things: deliberate and intensive study of the issues, the slow yet thorough process of reaching a consensus through the biennial convention, and a commitment to stay away from controversial issues.

At the same time that the question of activism sharpened conflict in the organization, the League was caught in another bind: the growth in women's commitments outside the home (especially paid employment) and a waning of the volunteer tradition which had always supplied most of its members. More activist women were joining groups like the National Organization for Women or the National Women's Political Caucus; competition also came from citizens' lobbying groups like Common Cause. The League strove to retain the loyalties of old members while recruiting new blood. Throughout the 1970s and 1980s, the L.W.V. has continued its historical commitment to study and thorough preparation of issues, but it has increasingly been involved in political and legislative action, styling itself as a "unique, multi-issue activist network."

While the League of Women Voters broke precedent in 1974 to allow men to join, for most of its history it has been exclusively a women's organization. What kind of women did the League attract? What did belonging to the League mean to women? There is no simple answer to such questions, because the League meant different things to different people.

The League operated on at least three separate, if interconnected, levels. On the national level, there is no doubt that the League attracted a group of sophisticated, committed, talented women who saw their positions in the League as full-time jobs. These women, who had all risen through the ranks from local and state Leagues, had both political savvy and a dedication to national issues that set them apart from the general membership. Effective lobbyists and superb publicists, they knew how to get

things done. In the amount of responsibility they wielded, and the seriousness with which they approached their commitments, they resembled the upper-level managers of a major corporation.

The experiences of state leaders were more varied than the national leadership. All state presidents had the responsibility of serving on the Council, which was the general governing body of the League in the alternative years when the convention did not meet. Serving on the state level could either be largely ceremonial or a full-time commitment that might also include membership on the national Board of Directors. Certain leagues were better organized and more activist than others: California, New York, Illinois, and Missouri, for example, carried on ambitious state programs that rivaled the national. Such states supplied much of the talent pool that the national board tapped for filling its positions. Other states, however, had such weak state organizations that they were often only paper organizations, merely a conduit from the national to the individual member.

The real vitality of the League lay at the local level, but once again, the experience varied widely, largely based on the temperaments and needs of individual members. For some women, especially women in small communities, the League was the most exciting thing that ever happened to them. Mary Anne Page Guyol, who joined the Red Wing, Minnesota, chapter during the Depression, recalled: "It filled a tremendous void in my life. . . . And I really did discover I could get things done. . . . I was right in the middle of the action, and I simply adored it." Guyol seconded the observation of Belle Sherwin that the L.W.V. was "a university without walls" when she observed: "You see, women rarely thought about going back to college or graduate school when the kids were gone. They couldn't afford it for one thing--and for another, it just wasn't done. So the League became our university, our graduate school--it was, well, just everything." In an increasingly mobile society, women knew that wherever they located, there would likely be a L.W.V. chapter where they could find women who shared their point of view.

Mary Ann Guyol went on to a position of national leadership in the League, symptomatic of how activity in a local league could propel certain women up the League hierarchy. Other League members used their training in political action to move directly into governmental and political offices of their own. On the other hand, not every woman who joined the League of Women Voters saw it as a stepping stone to full-time political activity. While the national board cared passionately about the implications of the newest tariff revisions or national water resource policy, the local members often found it difficult to relate to such faraway issues. Throughout the League's history, there were complaints that the commitment to study and implement the League's program of action made too many demands on the ordinary membership. Its reputation for thoroughness and study sometimes scared away women who feared that if they were not college-trained (and well-versed in Robert's Rules of Order) they might not be welcome. Since the League membership was overwhelmingly white and middle-class, women from different backgrounds often felt uncomfortable in this milieu.

The League of Women Voters' style of study and action contributed to the political education of several generations of American women, but the approach was not without its problems. Too often the membership was strangled by the structural imperatives to investigate and study, which took so much effort that there was no time left for action. This passion for study encouraged a tendency to, in the words of one national board member, "overtalk, overthink, overwrite," and generally avoid taking risks. Such a degree of thoroughness limited the organization's effectiveness and lessened its appeal to potential supporters, who grew frustrated with the League's cautious approach to political and social change.

Despite such limitations, the League of Women Voters deserves a central position in the story of twentieth-century political life. It transferred the energy of the suffrage movement into demands for citizen participation and voter awareness that are still relevant today. It provided channels for the cultivation of women's talents at a time when traditional organs of political expression, such as the Democratic and Republican parties, were hardly interested in training women for leadership. Although never a mass organization, it produced a corps of committed volunteers whose contributions to the functioning of government, especially on the local level, were vital to the democratic process in the United States. Providing a vehicle for women's political aspirations and defining an agenda of issues that women would promote in public life represent the collective contribution of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

BIBLIOGRAPHY

There is as yet no general history of the League of Women Voters, although Louise Young is revising such a manuscript for publication by the Greenwood Press. In 1920, flush with victory after the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment giving women the vote, female citizens prepared to take on new roles as a permanent and positive force in the American political system. The newly founded League of Women Voters was the vehicle that many former suffragists chose for their political participation. The history of the League in the dozen years after 1920, the period covered in this new installment of L.W.V. papers, thus provides a microcosm of the fortunes of recently enfranchised women in a rich and complex period of American political history.

In the 1920s, the League promoted an ambitious agenda for the woman citizen. Four areas were targeted for special attention in this early period of League history, and many of these issues have remained League priorities ever since. The first was lobbying and legislative action on behalf of the social welfare goals that had animated women's participation in the Progressive Era and the suffrage movement. For example, the League lobbied on the state and federal levels for passage of a constitutional amendment outlawing child labor--an effort that ultimately failed. In addition, the League worked aggressively for the passage of the 1921 Sheppard-Towner Act, a pathbreaking piece of legislation designed to improve maternal and infant health care.

Another major thrust of early L.W.V. activity concerned international cooperation, an issue of special importance in the immediate aftermath of the First World War. Led by former suffragist Carrie Chapman Catt, the League reached out to women's groups throughout the world in an effort to open channels of international cooperation to prevent future wars. The League also studied and endorsed plans for reduction in armaments, U.S. participation in the World Court and the League of Nations, and ratification of the Kellogg-Briand treaty.

From its founding, the League of Women Voters consistently devoted much attention to a third area that has always been closely associated with its name: voter education and citizenship training. Many women voters were uncertain about their new responsibilities, and in the 1920s the League worked to educate them about how to be responsible and intelligent citizens. The League also attempted to influence the Republican and Democratic party platforms in the 1920s, promoting social reform issues (e.g., Sheppard-Towner and the Child Labor Amendment) that the organization had singled out for action.

A final prominent area of League action in the 1920s concerned women's issues. The L.W.V. worked to improve women's legal status on the state and national levels, especially with regard to jury duty and the right to hold office. It also supported and lobbied for the 1922 Cable Act that protected the citizenship rights of women married to foreign nationals. At the same time, however, the League strongly opposed the Equal Rights Amendment put forward by Alice Paul and the National Woman's Party because it would threaten protective labor legislation for women workers and children. No compromise was possible on this divisive issue.

Throughout the 1920s, the League of Women Voters worked aggressively to implement these goals, and in certain cases--notably Sheppard-Towner and the Cable Act--it enjoyed definite success.

But like many other liberal and feminist organizations in the 1920s, the League had to devote scarce resources to defending itself against charges of radicalism and lack of patriotism, such as were contained in the infamous "spiderweb chart" that spuriously linked major women's organizations to subversive activity. Such red-baiting attacks, in conjunction with the generally conservative political climate of the decade, limited the organization's effectiveness. Also disappointing was the fact that barely 100,000 women joined the League--a dramatic drop from the several million who had belonged to its predecessor, the National American Woman Suffrage Association.

These general themes are well represented in our microfilm edition of national office subject files for 1920-1932. The subject files are the largest component of the L.W.V. records at the Library of Congress. They include a biennial alphabetical listing of office files of all national League officers; the national program files; permanent department and standing committee files on such issues as women in industry, women's legal status, child welfare, social hygiene, and efficiency in government; League correspondence with prominent individuals and with allied political organizations; and files relating to attacks on the League or its programs. Taken together, these records provide detailed documentation of the activities and motivations of the new American women voters who channeled their political energy through the League.

The subject files provide substantive records on the efforts of the League of Women Voters to set itself up on a sound, permanent basis. Material on the establishment of standing committees, finances, fund raising and membership, and recruitment of state and local chapters chronicles this institutional process. Of special interest is the material relating to the League's national leaders, a group of politically sophisticated and talented women, many of whom were seasoned veterans of the suffrage campaign. Some of the major figures in this period include suffrage leader and honorary L.W.V. president Carrie Chapman Catt; League presidents Maud Wood Park (1920-1924) and Belle Sherwin (1924-1934); finance director and chief fund-raiser Katharine Ludington; and such national officers as Minnie Fisher Cunningham, Pattie Ruffner Jacobs, Edna Gellhorn, Elizabeth Hauser, and Dorothy Kirchwey Brown. Through the personal correspondence of the national board, researchers can trace changing political ideologies and tactics, as well as the occasional clashes of personalities that polarized the organization. (For example, the papers document how Maud Wood Park and Carrie Chapman Catt disagreed sharply in 1921 over the extent to which the League should take credit for passage of the Sheppard-Towner Act.)

The subject files also provide comprehensive documentation of the ways in which the national L.W.V. cooperated with other women's organizations in the decade after suffrage. The prime example is the League's participation in the Women's Joint Congressional Committee, a lobbying coalition of ten national women's organizations headed in the 1920s by League president Maud Wood Park. The papers provide ample material on the workings of the Women's Joint Congressional Committee, especially with regard to the Sheppard-Towner Act. They also highlight the League's interaction with such groups as the National Consumers League, the American Association of University Women, the National Women's Trade Union League, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the Young Women's Christian Association, and the National Council of Jewish Women. In addition, the L.W.V. cooperated closely with such federal and state officials as Grace Abbott of the Children's Bureau, Mary Anderson of the Women's Bureau, and Frances Perkins of the New York State Department of Labor. The material documenting the interaction with such individuals and organizations confirms the importance of networks in shaping women's postsuffrage political activity.

The material presented in this installment does not contain the complete subject files for the years 1920-1932, but rather an extensive sampling of the material held at the Library of Congress. Publication of the files of individual states for this period is contemplated for later installments, although the present collection includes extensive material documenting the contact between the national and state leaders, as well as activism on the grassroots level. Since the records at the Library of Congress are essentially the League's working office files, a great deal of routine office correspondence has been systematically excluded. By selecting and condensing the most pertinent materials, this edition facilitates research into one of the most valuable collections for the study of the American woman in politics.

SOURCE NOTE

The materials microfilmed for this publication are reproduced from the holdings of the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. Literary rights to the collection, with the exception of the container inventory, are retained by the League of Women Voters of the United States.

EDITORIAL NOTE

Organization of the Collection

The League of Women Voters collection at the Library of Congress is composed of two overlapping series. Series I comprises 88 containers of early League of Women Voters (L.W.V.) records from 1920 through 1924. Series II spans 1,449 containers of records, which range from 1920 to 1961. The descriptive container inventory for each series is microfilmed at the beginning of Reel 1 of this publication.

As is apparent from the inventories, the two series are organized differently. Series I is organized alphabetically, while Series II is organized chronologically by biennia, then alphabetically. This publication contains selections from all of Series I and from Series II through the 1930-1932 biennia only.

Nature of the Collection and Editorial Policy

Several considerations led to the decision to proceed with a selective microform edition of the original collection. Foremost among these are the size and present arrangement of the collection, much of which is in the form of original office files that have not undergone archival processing. Mundane correspondence and routine interoffice communications are abundant. In combination with the imposing size of the original collection, the large amount of material of questionable historical value precluded the option of a comprehensive microfilm publication.

Moreover, for the early years of the collection, including all of Series I and at least the first two biennia of Series II, the present organization leaves much to be desired. There is, first of all, the obvious problem of the overlap between the two series up to 1924. Misfilings and inaccurate file headings are common among the early records. Perhaps the most difficult problem is that the earlier records are organized largely by single subjects or individual surnames, rather than by L.W.V. departments, committees, or programs as becomes the pattern in the mid 1920s.

Beginning with the 1924-1926 biennia of Series II, however, a much more regular arrangement begins to emerge, one which is based on the committee structure of the national L.W.V. itself. Materials such as committee or regional reports that in the early years tend to be filed under unlikely categories (under the last name of the committee chairman or regional director, for example) gradually fall under regular committee or regional files. Single subjects, such as child labor or the Get-Out-the-Vote program, gradually fall into regular administrative files--the Child Welfare Committee or the Department of Efficiency in Government, for example.

Furthermore, the biennial arrangement of Series II is itself a questionable principle for the arrangement of the early League records. The biennial arrangement for the bulk of Series II follows logically

from the fact that the administrative structure and the entire national program of the League of Women Voters are reassessed every two years by the national convention. However, the biennial structure was not adopted until the 1926 national convention. Up to then, the national L.W.V. conventions met annually, and the League was subject to annual reorganization, accordingly. (This in itself may provide a clue to the relative confusion among the early records as against the pattern which emerges from the mid-twenties onward.)

In consequence of the nature of the collection, the selection strategy for the early years is different from that which was possible as the collection became more coherent in the mid-twenties. The guiding principle for selections from the earlier materials has been to make a small yet highly discriminating sample of the historically significant materials. As a result, the early materials focus almost exclusively on the most concise and summary materials such as reports, minutes, and agendas, with a very light selection of the most revealing or items of the voluminous correspondence and internal memoranda. Researchers should be cognizant of the fact that the sampling is far from exhaustive for the early years of the League's history. More advanced researchers will almost certainly wish to follow up with a study of the original collection.

The user's guide leads researchers around the pitfalls of the early materials by indicating correct dates, listing documents that are misfiled, and providing a subject index. This microfilm sampling provides a very helpful introduction to a collection which is one of the great mines of information on the history of women in American politics in the postsuffrage era. The more complete nature of the collection after 1924, however, made possible a more comprehensive selection which is explained in greater detail below.

Selection Principles

An extensive list of priority files was prepared from the container lists by Advisory Editor Susan Ware. Under Professor Ware's direction, a team of UPA researchers systematically examined each file on the priority list with the aim of extracting the most historically significant materials. The aim throughout has been to provide the microfilm user with a clear sense of the manner in which the national office of the League of Women Voters worked to implement the political program mandated by the national convention. Among the many aspects of national office operations which the selection is designed to illustrate, the following were given especially careful attention:

Efforts of the national office to form alliances with other national (and international) organizations whose political goals were complementary to the League's program. These would include the National Consumer's League, the Women's Trade Union League, the Women's Joint Congressional Committee, and others. Included also are League efforts to maintain liaison with certain federal agencies whose provenance touched upon the objectives of the League program, such as the U.S. Children's Bureau, the Women's Bureau, and the War Department.

Lobbying activities in the U.S. Congress, including efforts to enact and renew the Sheppard-Towner bill that provided federal funding for maternal care and education; to enlist the U.S. to recognize the World Court; to equalize the rights of women citizens married to aliens; to oppose limitations on constitutional amendments; etc. Efforts to influence the platforms of the Democratic and Republican parties were also targeted.

Relations between the national L.W.V. and state and local Leagues on such matters as designing and implementing the Program of Work, recruiting new L.W.V. members, and interacting with other women's organizations such as the National Woman's Party, the YWCA, and the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

The following categories of files were systematically excluded from the priority list:

Convention and General Council files

State L.W.V. files

Publicity and printed material

Carrie Chapman Catt suffrage papers

General alphabetical files, i.e., files in the form of "A-General" or "A-Miscellaneous."

Selections from Convention and General Council Files have been already drawn upon for *Part II of the Papers of the League of Women Voters* and are available from University Publications of America (UPA). A series of state League of Women Voters files is planned for the future.

Of the remaining files, the following categories were selected for examination:

National officers' files

L.W.V. committee and departmental files

L.W.V. regional files

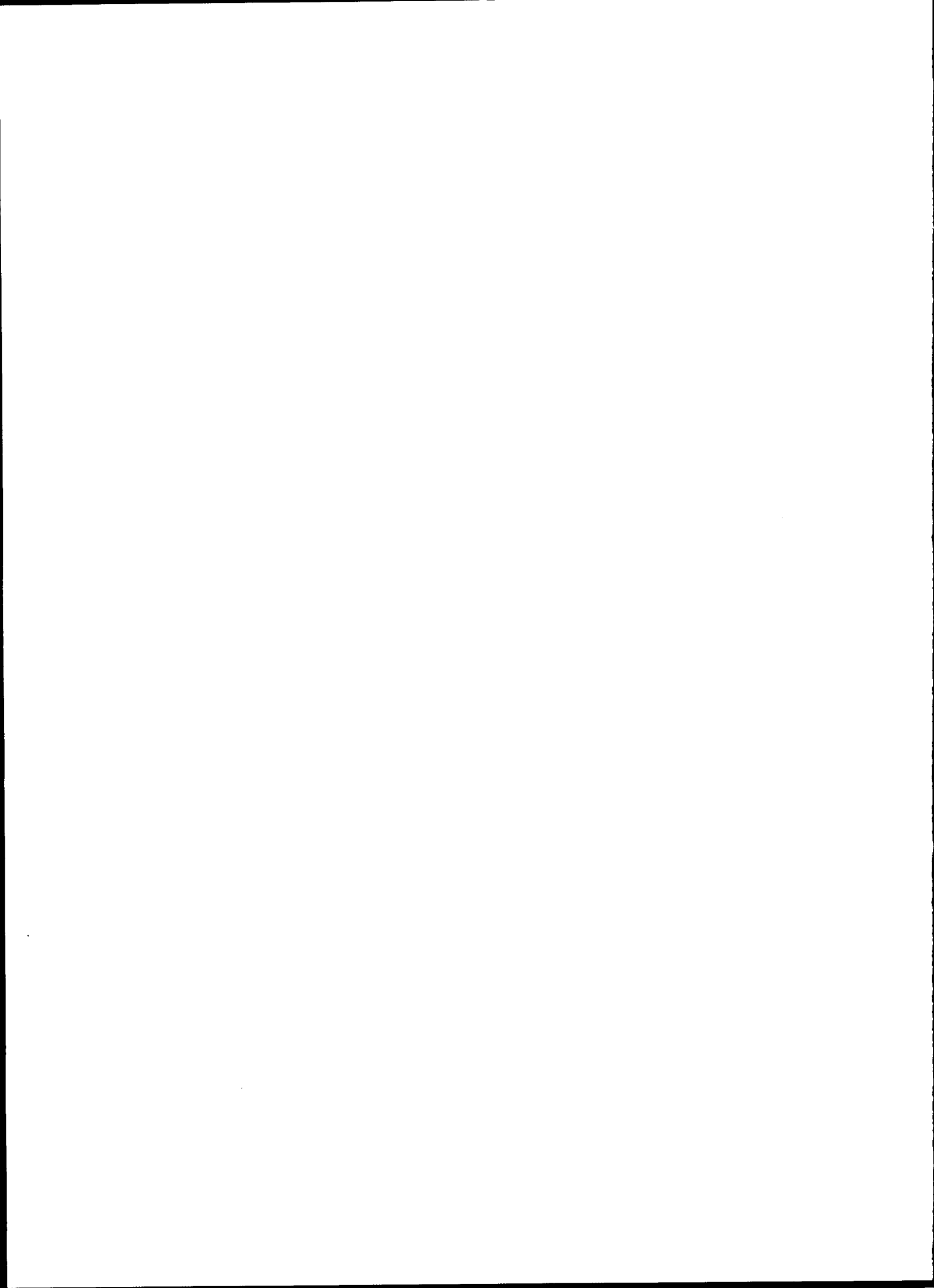
Files on other organizations of historical significance

All files bearing the name of an individual person (on the premise that any individual given his or her own file by the League secretary is likely to have played a role of some significance in League affairs)

Subject files pertinent to the League's major activities in the 1920s and early 1930s.

In making the detailed examination of each of these categories of files, researchers always selected summary materials such as program agendas, organizational plans, or reports of committees, departments, and regional officers. Greater discretion has been used in selecting from the correspondence, memoranda, and enclosures, however. As noted above, prior to the 1924 biennia of Series II, a very light selection was made of such material. After 1924, the organizational files become more coherent and therefore offer the opportunity of providing a wider selection. The aim in widening the selection has been to provide researchers with a fuller sense of the administrative process of implementing the League's program, including a much better sense of the style and personality of national League officers than can be ascertained via the lighter sampling or through the more summary documents. The post-1924 materials provide a much broader basis on which to assess the relations among national officers and between national officers and state League officers or leaders of organizations outside the League. Taken together with the increasingly copious committee, departmental, and regional reports, the wider selection of correspondence in the post-1924 material provides researchers with an excellent opportunity to gain familiarity with this major archival resource.

For accurate scholarly citation from the microfilm, in any file where one or more documents have been selected for reproduction, the file folder has been filmed prior to the actual document(s). Each file folder has been clearly marked with a roman numeral denoting Series I or Series II, which is followed by the container number as indicated on the inventory. Thus, II-29 indicates that the file in question comes from Series II, container 29. The user's guide also indicates series and container or box numbers along with file titles and corrective information for misfiles or inaccurately titled files.



SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The League of Women Voters (L.W.V.) National Office "Subject Files" microfilmed for this publication contain a great deal of valuable source material on the development of a progressive women's organization in the twelve years after the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment. The best approach toward understanding the activities of the national League of Women Voters is to understand the activities of its numerous standing committees, around which the bulk of the collection is organized. The records of standing committees detail the League's interaction with sympathetic organizations, its publicity and educational activities, and its relationship with state and local Leagues.

Although the number of records varies from one committee to another, each was basically responsible for maintaining liaison with state Leagues of Women Voters for the following purposes: gathering grassroots input in planning for programs of work; disseminating L.W.V. educational materials prepared by the national standing committees; or implementing the League's current program of work (which often meant pressuring local congressmen or state legislators on such matters as supporting a Child Labor Amendment or endorsing international peace proposals, the extension of federal funding for maternal and infant care, and several similar L.W.V. objectives in the 1920s). Committees were also responsible for coordinating alliances with like-minded women's and other civic associations. The subject matters typically covered by each national standing committee and department are itemized below. Researchers may consult them with profit on matters concerning both national and local activities.

Apart from the individual committees, an especially valuable series of records contained in the collection are those of the regions. For the purpose of building its national organization, the League divided the United States and its possessions into seven geographical regions. The regional records, which are filed alphabetically by the number of the region--Second Region, Seventh Region, Third Region, etc.--usually provide excellent local-level data on both the activities of local Leagues and their efforts to recruit new members. (See Appendix I.) Technically, these records belong to the Department of Organization, which was responsible for assisting in organizing new L.W.V.s. Like the records of the standing committees and departments, the regional records vary in number from year to year, but typically consist of correspondence between an on-site regional director or regional secretary and the secretary of the national Department of Organization. Also included are regular reports of the regional directors or secretaries while on circuit visiting local Leagues throughout the region. Many of these regional reports have been either misfiled or filed in unlikely places, but the subject index of the user's guide can be consulted to find stray documents for the regions.

A third type of file category common to the collection is that which lists prominent individuals. The personal files of the two L.W.V. national presidents whose tenures span the dates of this publication can be found here (Maud Wood Park, 1920-1924, and Belle Sherwin, 1924-1934), as can the files of Honorary Chairman Carrie Chapman Catt. However, most other individuals' files would have been more properly filed under appropriate national standing committees, regions, or under subject files for other organizations which the individuals in question represented. Accordingly, researchers are advised to coordinate the files of individuals with files of appropriate L.W.V. committees, departments, and regions. The user's guide subject index will be of assistance in this regard.

The fourth major type of file used throughout the collection is the subject file. Subject files may pertain to an issue, such as child labor, or to another organization, a government agency, or an L.W.V. program. As with the individuals' files, many of the subject files would ideally have been integrated into standing committee and department files. This problem is especially common in the early years of the collection and particularly in Series I. Again, the researcher should be cognizant of the fact that the national office of the League always operated through standing committees, and despite the infrequency of standing committee files for the early years, subject files should be seen in the context of national committee work.

Researchers are also alerted to the two initial parts of the UPA microfilm edition of the *Papers of the League of Women Voters. Part I, Meetings of the Board of Directors, 1918-1974* provides the most elite records of the national office from month to month for the period covered by this publication and beyond. *Part II, Records of National Conventions and General Councils* provides the records for the ultimate formulation of L.W.V. national policy. Both of these are integral to the present edition.

As mentioned in the Editorial Note, the League's organization was subject to annual change through 1926. Revisions and new entries are common from year to year, as are personnel changes in committee, departmental, and regional chairmanships. In an effort to provide researchers with a reference chart to the organization, the annual national office structure for each year covered by the microfilm has been reproduced in Appendix II to the user's guide. Researchers should bear in mind that the League's organizational year begins with the April national convention, and it was in April of any year that the structural changes were typically made. Thus, for example, the chart for 1924 actually applies from April 1924 to April 1925.

Committee on Child Welfare

By far the dominant themes running through the files of the Child Welfare committee are the enactment of a constitutional amendment prohibiting child labor in the United States, and the enactment of federal legislation (the Sheppard-Towner bill) providing grants to states for educational and clinical care for expectant mothers and infants. The Child Labor Amendment was launched in reaction to the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in *Bailey v. Drexel Furniture Co.*, which effectively restrained Congress from legislating on conditions of employment in private industry and specifically voided a federal bill against child labor. The records reveal the early optimism of the proponents as well as the growing sense of disillusionment with the prospects for reform toward the end of the 1920s.

The Sheppard-Towner Act, on the other hand, was one of the League's major successes of the 1920s. Its authorization was limited to two years, which made it necessary for the League, in coalition with other social welfare-minded organizations, to fight for extension of the funding law every two years throughout the 1920s. As the conservative opposition to the program gained the upper hand, Sheppard-Towner funding for maternal and infant care expired altogether in 1930. The files for the early Depression years provide evidence, however, of League efforts to reinvolve the federal government in maternal and health care as a matter of Depression relief.

Given the intense interest of the League in the Child Labor Amendment and the Sheppard-Towner bill, the Committee on Child Welfare must be considered one of the most important committees within the organization.

Department of Efficiency in Government

The foremost goal of this department was to increase voter participation in democratic institutions at all levels of government. To that end it provided the back-up for a network of Citizenship Schools organized by state and local L.W.V.s in the early 1920s. As the Citizenship Schools were transferred to the oversight of the Department of Political Education in 1924, the Department of Efficiency in Government channelled similar energy into its Get-Out-the-Vote campaign, which was, again, organized via state and local L.W.V.s in an effort to increase registration and actual voting among both men and women in the face of widespread political apathy and frequent declines in votes cast in elections during the 1920s.

From the early 1920s the Department of Efficiency in Government evinced interest in civil service reform and the wider application of the direct primary, but these issues received much higher priority in the late 1920s. By the 1930s there was a marked rise of interest in studying forms of government

organization, including the direct primary, the city manager, and other model forms of local government.

In part the League's growing interest in forms of government was a defensive reaction to a late 1920s proposed Constitutional amendment (Wadsworth-Garrett) that attempted to impose new requirements that would make the process of amending the Constitution much more difficult. Wadsworth-Garrett was in turn a conservative reaction to the increasing tendency of liberals to avail themselves of the Constitutional amendment route on issues such as child labor and equal rights for women.

Department of International Cooperation to Prevent War

This department, which evolved in 1922 from the Committee for Reduction of Armaments, kept most of the documentation on the League's involvement in foreign affairs. The material for the early 1920s shows the League working in concert with other arms-limitation groups to force a retrenchment in military armaments worldwide. By 1923, emphasis began to shift toward support for mechanisms of international arbitration as an alternative to war, and especially to support of United States recognition of a world court.

With minor variations, these causes continued to elicit the support of the Department of International Cooperation into the 1930s, where the records detail its support of the London Naval Treaty in 1930, various conferences on disarmament, the Kellogg-Briand international conciliation accord, and the World Court.

An important side issue which runs throughout the committee's records, especially from the mid 1920s onward, is the competition between the League of Women Voters and the National Woman's Party for stature within the international community. The issue came to a head in 1926 as the L.W.V. engineered the rejection of the Woman's Party's application for admission to the International Woman Suffrage Association.

Support of suffragist aspirations in Latin America as well as a keen interest in developing more positive relations between the U.S. and Latin American nations are also recurrent themes. Researchers should be sure to consult the individual files for Carrie Chapman Catt and Ruth Morgan in conjunction with this committee's records.

Committee on the Legal Status of Women

This committee evolved in 1924 from two predecessors, the Committee on Unification of Laws concerning the Civic Status of Women (1920) and the Committee on Uniform Laws concerning Women (1921-1923). The early committees focused on the elimination of sex discrimination in state civil codes, including marriage, parental guardian, and community property laws. By the mid-twenties, the eligibility of women for jury service and the participation of women in the affairs of the national political parties received prominent attention as well. On the federal level, the League successfully supported the Cable Act, which was introduced to prevent the loss of U.S. citizenship by American women who married foreign nationals.

While the Committee on the Legal Status of Women fought these and other battles to place women citizens on equal footing with male citizens, it was nonetheless the committee responsible for coordinating opposition to the feminist Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), which was sponsored by the National Woman's Party. The ERA, which League officials derided as the "blanket amendment," sought to amend the Constitution to eliminate all laws discriminating against women on the basis of their sex. Such a proposal, League officials and their allies argued, would jeopardize state factory legislation protecting women workers for which social welfare advocates such as the League had labored long and assiduously.

Concern with the prospect of the Equal Rights Amendment continued into the 1930s, at which point a new issue began to emerge: the discriminatory dismissals of women workers in favor of males as a Depression employment practice.

Department of Legislation and Law Enforcement

The functions of this department overlap to a considerable degree with many other standing committees and departments. It was charged with monitoring legislation at the state level on all issues

affecting the League's program of work, including the Child Labor Amendment, the Sheppard-Towner extensions, protective labor legislation, the fight against the Equal Rights Amendment, and elimination of discrimination against women in state civil codes. To this end, it often compiled useful summaries of state L.W.V. legislative activities, such as may be found in the "Summary of Legislation" in the department's files for the 1924-1926 biennium, which provides a valuable state-by-state synopsis of L.W.V. successes and failures.

The term "law enforcement" in the committee title seems to have been inserted with an eye toward the law enforcement problems associated with prohibition. While documentation on the matter is thin, it is in this committee's files where the issue of national prohibition is typically covered.

The Department of Legislation and Law Enforcement served as the coordinator for congressional lobbying. It was responsible for coordinating legislative liaison with national clearinghouses such as the O.A.R. (Organizations Associated for the Ratification of the Child Labor Amendment) and the W.J.C.C. (Women's Joint Congressional Committee) over the entire course of the period covered by this publication. Researchers are referred to files in the 1928-1930 biennia under Sheppard-Towner-Newton bills and the file for the 71st Congress, which provide a full picture of the League as a congressional lobby for social welfare legislation.

Committee on Living Costs

This committee evolved in 1922 from the Committee on Food Supply and Demand. The records of the predecessor committee in the early twenties feature a confrontation with the meat packing industry, particularly the Swift Premium Company, over the question of adulterated foodstuffs. A persistent although not especially well-documented issue is the standard requirement of a family budget, a concern which was perhaps intended to support advocacy of female minimum wage legislation.

By the mid 1920s two issues emerge that dominate the committee's focus into the 1930s: rising tariffs and the experimental public utility project in the Tennessee Valley at Muscle Shoals, Alabama. The Committee on Living Costs assailed the tariff by demonstrating its adverse impact upon family budgets, while it vigorously supported extensions of federal financing for the Muscle Shoals project.

Department of Organization

The Department of Organization was responsible for developing League membership nationwide. To this end it served as the clearinghouse for reports from regional directors and special League organizers in the field, provided background support for regional directors, ran the national office's Speaker's Bureau, and maintained liaison with college L.W.V. chapters.

Among the most valuable organizational records are certainly the reports from special League organizers and regional directors. While the quality of these reports varies from one director to another, the reports generally provide on-site field reports of local League activities from around the region. They typically report the size of the local League, its financial condition, and its methods of raising money, as well as providing personal impressions and socio-economic backgrounds of local leaders. Some of the best reports cast light on the social makeup of the local L.W.V. membership as well as on the local political climate in which the League functioned. An example of especially rich regional reports can be found for the Sixth Region for the 1924-1926 and 1926-1928 biennia on Reels 8 and 24, which depict the League interacting with groups as diverse as the National Woman's Party, the Ku Klux Klan, and the Democratic and Republican parties. A notable report from the Sixth Region carries a lengthy "intelligence" summary on the July 1927 convention of the National Woman's Party held in Colorado.

The files for the early 1920s frequently contain detailed reports by special L.W.V. organizers describing local meetings and noting attendance figures as well as the attitudes of potential recruits in the audience. By the mid 1920s, when the system of reporting described above became more common, the Department of Organization began to develop L.W.V. chapters on college campuses. The college recruitment strategy featured a cross-country speaking tour by Maud Wood Park in 1926. In general, the records on college leagues provide interesting insights into the attitudes of college women in the 1920s.

Department of Political Education

This department was established in the later 1920s to focus on the League's ambitious program of grassroots education in civic responsibility. Its chief voter education program was the Citizenship School, which it inherited from the Department of Efficiency in Government and which was sponsored by local and college L.W.V. chapters, with backup support from the national office. Special issues of increasing concern in the late 1920s were anti-corruption programs for municipal governments, permanent voter registration laws, the proposed "Lame Duck" constitutional amendment, and the direct primary.

Department of Public Welfare in Government

The Department of Public Welfare in Government was established in 1926 essentially to coordinate activities among the following national standing committees, which are described in detail elsewhere in this scope and content note: Child Welfare, Women in Industry, Education, Social Hygiene, and Living Costs. In the early 1930s, it took the lead in staking out the national L.W.V. position on Depression relief policies, especially in its advocacy of a federal employment service.

Radio Committee

The Radio Committee was established in 1927, and its files depict L.W.V. efforts to capitalize on the mass media as an instrument of education. To this end, the committee typically worked with the Department of Political Education in order to arrange broadcasts of the "Voter's Service" and occasionally of Citizenship Schools. The records reveal the difficulty L.W.V. programs faced in competing with popular entertainment radio programs. Researchers should also consult the files of Katharine Ludington, chairman of the committee.

Reading Committee

The Reading Committee was, in essence, an editorial board for national L.W.V. publications, whose files contain manuscript copies submitted to the committee by other national standing committees on a wide range of issues. Editorial comments are frequently revealing as to the policy positions of the national League officers who made up the Reading Committee.

Committee on Social Hygiene

Early records of the Social Hygiene Committee are sparse and unrevealing. It was established in 1921 and appears to have concerned itself primarily with maternal health and infant care in the early 1920s. Fuller documentation for the later 1920s reveals activities on a wide range of issues, including prostitution (especially on the issue of equal prosecution of patrons and prostitutes), birth control, sterilization of mental defectives, corrections policies, and juvenile delinquency. Of special interest are the records of a Special Committee to Abolish the Social Hygiene Committee, set up in 1930. This reassessment of the League's efforts in this area reveals the attitudes of some state and national League leaders on the social hygiene issue.

Women in Industry Committee

From its inception in 1921 and throughout the 1920s, this committee coordinated the League's advocacy of protective labor legislation for women workers (such as prohibition of night work, minimum wages for female employees, sanitary and safety regulations, etc.). Due to Supreme Court restrictions on the U.S. Congress's authority to enact such types of legislation, protective legislation advocacy was necessarily a matter of lobbying at the state level and also of monitoring state protective legislation already in effect. On the federal level, the committee's activities centered upon the U.S. Women's Bureau of the Department of Labor. Apart from maintaining regular liaison with the Women's Bureau and cooperating in the latter's own educational programs, the League regularly supported adequate budget appropriations for the Bureau as well as nondiscriminatory staff salaries for Women's Bureau employees.

By the 1930s, the Women in Industry Committee became increasingly involved with depression relief and coordinated support for federal unemployment legislation, particularly for the adoption of an unemployment insurance program and a national employment service.

Special Committees

In addition to the standing committees, the National League of Women Voters set up special committees from time to time to deal with individual topics. One of the best documented special committees, whose records have been included in their entirety, is the Special Committee on the Negro Problem, which was established in 1922 and evolved into the Special Committee on Inter-Racial Problems in 1924.

Other special committees whose records are scattered throughout the collection include the Special Committee of Inquiry on the Direct Primary; the Special Committee on Immigration; and the Special Committee to Abolish the Social Hygiene Committee.

REEL INDEX

The extensive National Office Subject Files of the League of Women Voters at the Library of Congress are contained in file folders that are stored in numbered boxes. In the interest of facilitating access to material within folders, this index denotes the major substantive issues, reports, or relevant committees under the category *Major Subjects*. Individuals who contributed significant correspondence, wrote particularly insightful memoranda, or authored reports within folders are denoted under the category *Principal Correspondents*. Dates given are those actually recorded on the file folders; when dates are missing or incorrect, the correct dates appear in brackets.

The National Office Subject Files of the League of Women Voters (L.W.V.) often refer to a member or correspondent by her married name; however, these women were also known by, or used, their given and maiden names. Whenever possible, the given and maiden names are provided in brackets.

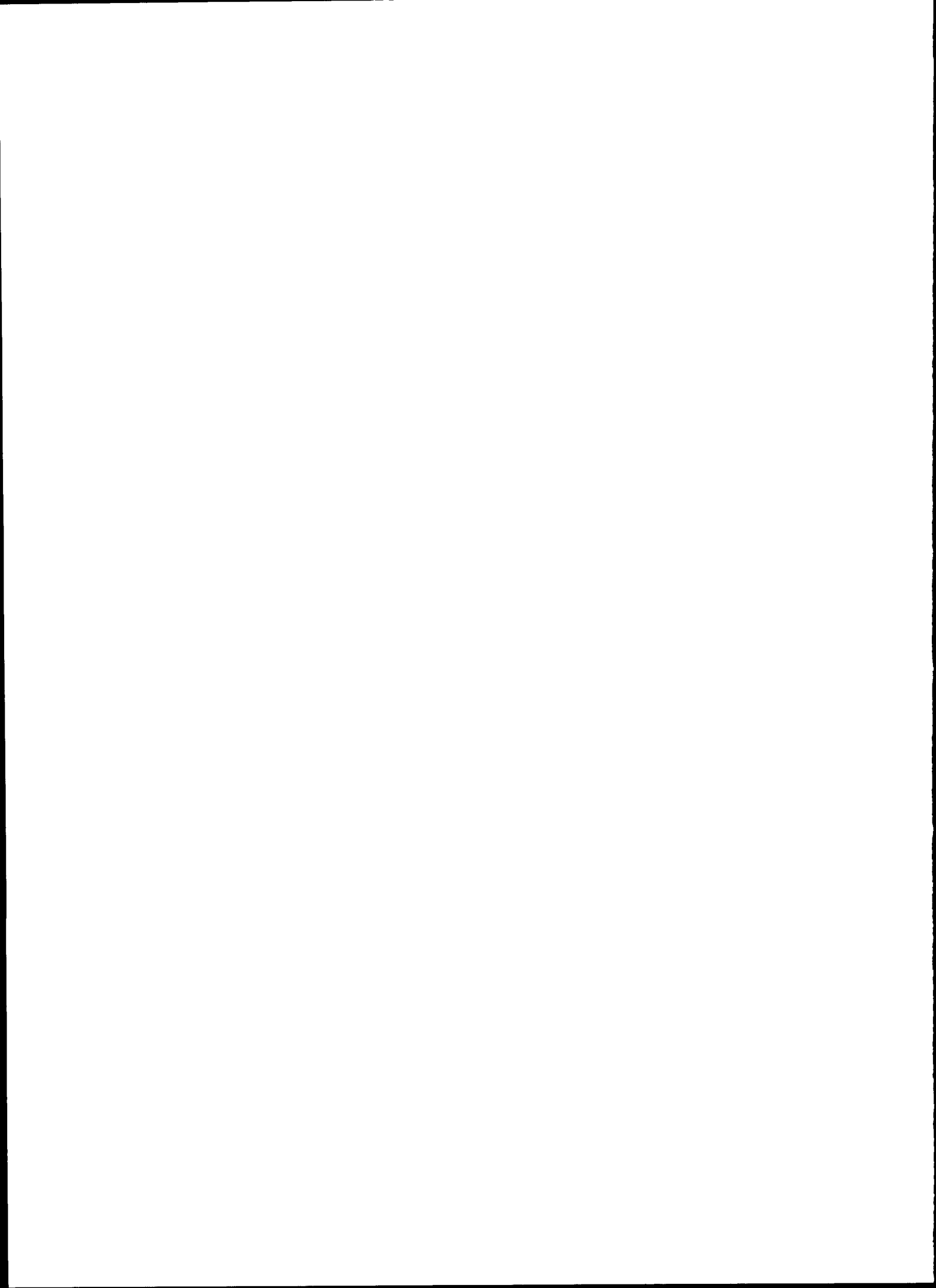
