Coming in May 2022! The Far Eastern Economic Review Archive will offer users electronic access to the full run of this major newsweekly, comprising almost 3,000 issues, from its launch in 1946 to 2009.* Renowned for its high-quality, authoritative reporting, it was concerned not only with economic matters but also politics, society, international relations, global issues, and the arts; it is a key resource for research in all of these facets of the of the Asia/Asia-Pacific regions and beyond. Following an initial emphasis on China and Hong Kong, the scope of the magazine's coverage subsequently expanded to encompass other regions and countries, including Japan, India and Australia, as well as smaller Asian states.

By making more than six decades of content easily accessible, The Far Eastern Economic Review Archive allows users to take a historical approach to understanding contemporary political economy in Asian states and to trace the major financial, commercial, political, and social developments during this period. The respected reporting by the Review's journalists was supplemented by freelance contributions from professionals across the region, as well as interviews with government officials and other influential figures in the political and business worlds. Besides the coverage of local and regional subjects, there were special reports on global issues with significance for Asia (e.g. the HIV/AIDS epidemic, climate change), as well as articles about international diplomatic, security, and trade relationships.

Among the many research topics supported by this archive, users may, for example, build an understanding of local populations' experiences of revolutionary wars in Asia, examine the evolution of strategic economic and political alliances between countries in the region with western powers, and research social trends in Asian states, such as developing educational policies and outcomes.

The content is digitized in color page-image format, ensuring that the magazine's important visual content is displayed in its original context. Article-level metadata and searchable text will enable users to quickly locate the most relevant content for their research among the thousands of issues.
